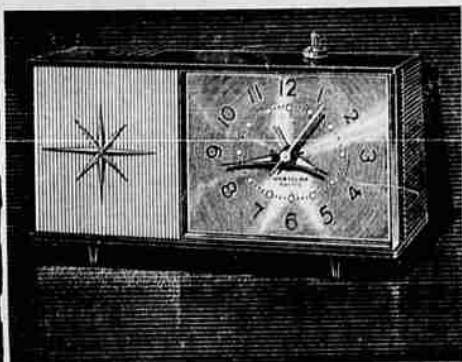

## THE Lighter Side... BY DICK WEST

United Press International. WASHINGTON (UPI) — As little as you might think about it, which in most cases is very little indeed, a congressman's wife is also his constituent.

She has a right, just like any other citizen, to buttonhole her congressman and seek a redress of grievances.

She also has a right, if things don't work out to her satisfaction, to vote against him in the next election.

A congressman may not pay much heed to his spouse when she speaks to him as a wife. But when she addresses him as a constituent, he is dutybound to listen.

### Plagues Constituent

If, then, a congressman introduces legislation specifically designed to please his wife, he is only doing what he would do for any other constituent. No more, no less.

Bear this in mind, please, as we consider a resolution introduced in the House this week by Rep. Compton I. White Jr., an Idaho Democrat and husband.

White's resolution resolves that "The Committee on House Administration shall issue to the spouse of each member of the House of Representatives an appropriate identification card."

At first glance, the need for this particular type of legislation might not appear acute.

I'll confess that its significance eluded me in the beginning.

But after talking with White, and reading a companion press release, I can see how it would serve a worthy purpose.

White explained that his wife and the wives of some of his colleagues have had difficulty identifying themselves while out shopping in Washington.

### Check-Cashing Difficult

When they tried to cash checks or open charge accounts and were asked for identification, they could only produce documents from their home states. Some stores balked at accepting these.

The ladies reasoned that it would be simpler to carry a congressional identification card than it would to take a husband along every time they went shopping, which sounds logical.

So White introduced his resolution to accommodate them.

It might be argued that the measure if a form of nepotism, since a congressman is using his official position to promote legislation for a member of his family. But that is clearly nonsense.

No husband in his right mind would do anything to make it easier for his wife to cash checks and open charge accounts while shopping.

A congressman would only do that for a constituent.

## Loggers Appeal For Compensation Following Strike

PORTLAND (UPI) — Hearings opened Tuesday on appeals by Oregon and Washington loggers and sawmill workers of rulings denying them unemployment compensation during last summer's lumber strike.

Taking part are six attorneys from lumber firms, four from the International Woodworkers of America and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union and officials of the two states.

The first witness Tuesday was C. S. Schaefer of Salem, supervisor of the adjustment department of the Oregon Employment Department. He described how that agency decides whether a labor dispute is under way when claims for compensation are submitted.

### Several Days Seen

The session are expected to last several days. Opposing attorneys did seek to speed them up by stipulating that the unions struck U.S. Plywood Co. and St. Regis Paper Co. June 5 and that Weyerhaeuser Co., Crown Zellerbach, International Paper Co. and Rayonier then shut down.

Union lawyers refused to agree to a proposal by Herbert E. Wieland of Seattle, representing Weyerhaeuser, that only one attorney from each side be allowed to cross-examine witnesses.

M. F. McFarland, chief referee for Oregon, presided, with Harold L. Seely, appeals examiner for Washington, beside him. Each state will hold other hearings on individual cases later.



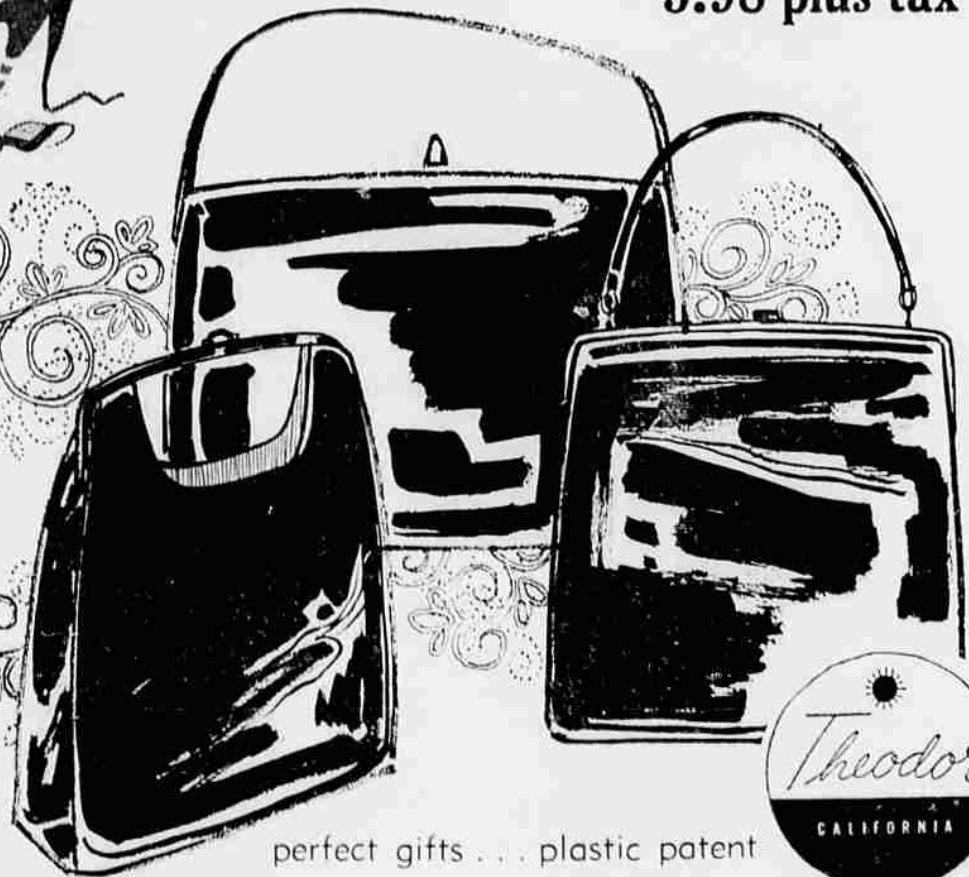

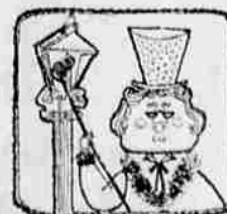

### EDUCATION GAP AND JOBS

Mississippi spends around \$20 a year to educate its pupils while New York State spends around \$620, almost three times as much — and this startling gap between the poor and rich states spend on education will become even greater as our educational operating costs leap in one decade from \$18 billion in 1960 to \$35 billion in 1970.

"Are we to be content," asks William S. Paley, chairman of Columbia Broadcasting System, "with the incredible idea that the accident of a child's place of residence will decide whether he shall have an adequate educational opportunity?"

We accept the need for national policies in the areas of food and drugs, labor disputes, the weather, fisheries, rail and air travel, farm crops, hundreds of other things.

"Are we to cling to the antiquated notion," Paley persists, "that while these are appropriate and necessary areas for systematic national action, education is not?"

Never has the problem of adequate education of our young been as demanding as today and never has it been more painfully obvious that as a nation, we are not even facing the problem.

In our society, the uneducated individual is doomed to a shrinking role at the very bottom of the economic pyramid. Yet, millions of young men and women are pouring into the labor force in the 1960s without a high school or even an elementary school diploma. In our country, automation is wiping out jobs for the unskilled and creating new jobs for the skilled at an unprecedented pace. Yet we are ignoring automation's clear warning that unless we upgrade the education of our workers, our economy's growth will be stunted by an acute shortage of skilled workers while simultaneously we spend billions a year to support monstrous numbers of unemployed and unemployables.

Just last month Secretary of Labor Wirtz told delegates to an AFL-CIO convention that we must wage a "war on ignorance" to make education "our largest economic enterprise." President Johnson already has made it clear that he will give top priority to a federal aid to education bill during the next session.

But the fact that we have neither a national educational policy nor a national educational standard is an enormous barrier to progress. Education in the U.S. is a hodgepodge of widely divergent state and local practices. Some communities have no compulsory education at any age. Some states require school to 18 years of age, some require none at all. Most states which have compulsory education laws also permit exceptions which amount to huge loopholes in the laws.

Admittedly, the whole question of a national educational policy is confused now by racial, religious and emotional issues. Admittedly, many Americans fear that federal aid to Defense Education Act of 1958 — "the most sweeping postwar education law to lead to federal control. But Paley's vigorous retort is that neither the GI Bill of 1944 nor the National legislation in education" — has resulted in dictation by the federal government in our schools and colleges. He points out that in the 15 years he has been a trustee of Columbia, this university has received over \$200 million in federal funds but that has been absolutely no threat of any form of federal control.

Paley believes we must take these two steps:

(1) Establish and strictly enforce basic minimum standards for primary and secondary education in terms of number of years of compulsory attendance and number of hours of instruction; and (2) Make it clear that the federal government must step in to fill the void if a state fails for any reason to provide the essential basic education which our national interests require.

More than a century ago, the first great educational revolution swept over the U.S. when, in 1862, we committed ourselves to the concept that education should be available to all.

Now Paley is among our thoughtful leaders calling for the second great revolution via a commitment to a standard of education for all.

I'll submit just one statistic to suggest what could be our future if we continue to duck this explosive problem of education: Today, with our economy at the highest levels ever, a shuddering 15.4 per cent of all teen-agers seeking jobs can't get them.
