

Regional Roundup

It's time for our annual column on the subject of fog. We rather look forward to the foggy season. It brings with it an interesting study in human nature — and a challenge to one's skill behind the wheel.

Our favorite hobby during fog season is to observe how residents of various parts of the Rogue Valley do their best to imply that the fog is worse somewhere else other than where they live.

One commonly held belief is that Medford has more fog than Grants Pass. Literature distributed by the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce, for example, states that "Occasional morning fog occurs during winter mornings" in that area.

We became somewhat perplexed last winter when on several occasions we left Medford in the early afternoon in sunshine and drove to Grants Pass, only to find it fogged in. We became even more perplexed when we noticed the same thing on two occasions during the last part of November of this year.

The Facts Were Uncovered

Determined to get to the bottom of the mystery, we conducted some exhaustive research with the Medford Weather Bureau and at the city water filtration plant in Grants Pass where weather information is compiled for that city.

As a result of our research, we uncovered the following details:

During 1962, there were 71 days on which Medford experienced a substantial amount of fog, but in Grants Pass the total was 92 days. Medford had 14 foggy days in January, 1962, while Grants Pass had 19. In February it was Medford eight, Grants Pass 11; March, Medford three, Grants Pass 8; September, Medford one, Grants Pass zero; October Medford 15, Grants Pass 15; November, Medford 10, Grants Pass 17; December, Medford 20, Grants Pass 22.

During October and November of 1963 combined, Medford had fog on 23 days (nine in October, 14 in November) while Grants Pass had it on 34 days (12 in October and 22 in November).

Our second favorite hobby during the fog season, after the stuff starts hanging around all day, is to take a drive up above the fog.

We are fortunate in this area to be able to get out of the fog in a few minutes' drive. The Applegate Valley is clear a good part of the time when Medford, Grants Pass and points in between are not. Ashland often is up in the sunshine. And traveling north on Oregon 62, one can usually drive out of the fog between Shady Cove and Prospect, or by going up the Butte Falls Highway or up Oregon 227 toward Tillamook.

Our Prospect correspondent, Velda Barr, reports that it has been sunny and warm up there the last few days. You don't even need an overcoat during midday, she says.

Elevation Makes a Difference

Fog seems to have a built-in sense of equilibrium. It appears to stay level, with respect to elevation. When Medford has a heavy layer of fog right on the ground, Grants Pass (about 400 feet lower in elevation than Medford) is usually "below" the fog. Consequently motorists over there get good visibility along the ground while Medford area drivers must grope around with anywhere from half a block to a few blocks visibility.

Driving in heavy fog at night poses a few problems, to say the least. They are not insurmountable, however. We find the freeway the most comforting place to be on such occasions. One does not have to worry about a car suddenly pulling out of a driveway. There are more white lines to use as guides. And inevitably someone will come along who wants to drive faster than you are traveling. So let him pass, and then follow his tail-lights. One exception: If the temperature is much below 32, avoid the Medford Viaduct.

Clothing Collection At Ashland Schools

ASHLAND — For the 22nd year a collection of good used clothing will be made for the "Save the Children Bundle Day." Students in the elementary schools of Ashland were asked to contribute wearable clothes to be distributed to needy children in the southern Appalachian mountain areas.

Stanley Jobe, superintendent of schools, declared that there is a desperate need for shoes, warm coats, suits, sweaters, underwear and any sort of clothing. He said that there is "an appalling percentage of drop-outs for lack of even minimum apparel."

According to Verne Speirs, who heads the drive, there will be a collection center at each school. The public is urged to assist in this national non-sectarian project of the Save the Children Federation.

A Creek's Short Journey Into Oblivion Snider Tells Gold Hill Chamber About Alba Trip

SISKIYOU COUNTY — Antelope Creek in mid-Siskiyou County is a small creek with a short, obscure course, a source that is indefinite and a terminus that is final.

The creek begins in the vicinity of northeastern Mt. Shasta. It flows northeasterly for a little more than a dozen miles, only to sink into oblivion. Its burial place, Antelope Sink, attracts more attention than the whole length of the stream.

Best place to locate Antelope Creek is at Tennant, a town abandoned by International Paper Company, and now trying to be caught up by a few private firms.

Its greatest usefulness appears to be that it supplies the former lumbering camp of Tennant with domestic water, and a few hardy souls fish for trout in a few spots along its mountain-bound length.

This creek may be credited with another benefit. Beyond where its waters sink, Red Rock Valley contains a ranch given over to strawberry plant culture.

Total precipitation in this arid region is a scant 9 inches of moisture annually. But a well has been sunk that contacts with a subterranean flow which gives hundreds of gallons per minute from April 1 to November 1. Water from Antelope Sink is credited with supplying this source.

Antelope Creek is a perfect example of Western streams that are limited in their reach through environment. But they carry the flow from its source to its terminus. The Mississippi, or Amazon do no more.

To locate this stream, find the old lumbering town of Tennant. Then to see the end of its trail, follow a good map to Antelope Sink.

Other scenes discovered will prove to be fringe benefits that will amply repay one for the journey. One gets deep into lava country and into California pioneer history reaching back more than a century.

Rogers Elected To Prospect Fire Board

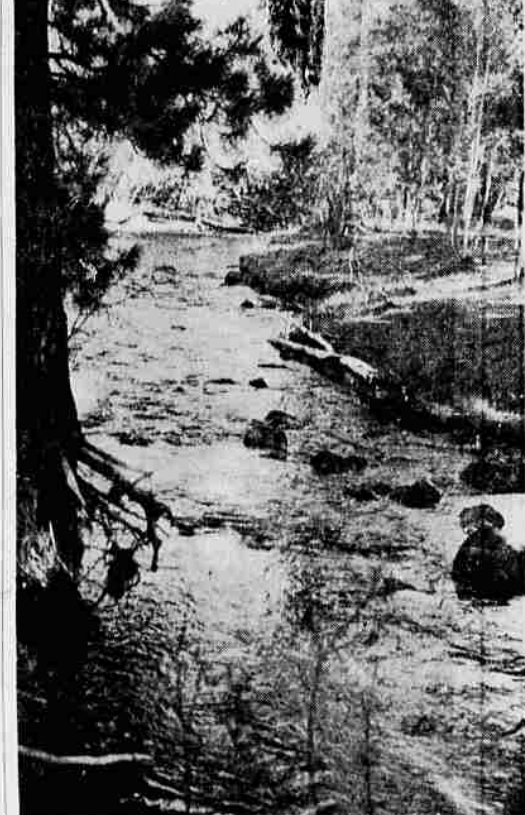
PROSPECT — Chester L. Rogers has been elected to the board of directors of the Prospect Rural Fire Protection District.

Sales Tax Said Favored By About 90 Per Cent Of State's Businessmen

ASHLAND — A general sales tax, with or without inclusion of food, is favored by 90 per cent of Oregon businessmen according to Douglas Heider, speaker before the Ashland Chamber of Commerce at its Tuesday luncheon meeting.

Heider, director of the Retail Council, Associated Oregon Industries, and a former state legislator from Marion county, declared that the state faces a "dollar gap" of \$41 million which must be met at the next session of the legislature.

He pointed to the fact that in the past 10 years the general budget has increased from \$175 million to \$366 million.

The speaker, giving basically the same talk he delivered for the Medford Chamber Monday, reviewed the principal cause for the increase, saying that basic school support costs have doubled and higher education costs tripled in the last decade.

During that period no substantial tax changes were made and the state was able to carry on its financial program from accumulated surpluses, by its progressive income tax rate and by passing some temporary "one-shot" revenue measures.

Ran Into Trouble
This year the legislature ran into trouble with a \$37 million budget increase and presented the taxpayers with a \$60 million package which the voters refused to accept.

During the special session the budget has been reduced from \$401 million to \$338 million, which still leaves a \$41 million gap. Ways of solving the problem are being studied by many groups said Heider. All are

Alba, Italy, the sister city of Medford, he said, has a population of about 25,000 and is located in the northern part of Italy about 300 miles from Rome.

Snider said Alba has a large candy factory which employs some 4,000 people and has a fleet of 2,000 trucks to make delivery.

Alba, he said, also has a large textile mill that employs another 4,000 people. He made a tour of both plants.

Stay With Family
During their 11-day visit in Alba, the former Medford mayor and his family stayed with an Italian family whose home is approximately 1,000 years old.

He said Alba, Italy, is reported to be older than Rome, and is built on top of an ancient city.

While in Alba, Snider was shown the city charter which is called the Book of Chain issued when the city was founded some 1,000 years ago.

Turin, Italy, was the next stop. While there the Snider family visited the Fiat Auto Factory which employs 120,000 people producing passenger cars and trucks of all sizes.

The Sniders next went to Rome where four days were spent visiting the Vatican, the Cistine Chapel and various art galleries and places of interest.

Leaving Rome by plane, they stopped in Paris one day. Then went on to London where they stayed two days before continuing the flight home via the Arctic Circle route to Seattle, Wash., and on home to Medford.

The former Medford mayor said he and his family found the Italians a warm and gracious people. They had little difficulty with the language because the Sniders' daughter spoke some Italian and many Italians spoke some English.

Reiph James, president, conducted the business session. Guest other than the speaker were Harry Andrews, general foreman at Ideal Cement Plant in Gold Hill, and Carolyn B. Hoover, of Darling Real Estate Agency, Gold Hill office.

James appointed a nominating committee which consists of Richard Abbott, former

president of the Chamber, Virginia Plummer and Jack J. Cannon.

In conjunction with the 1964 membership drive, it was decided that a group from the chamber will visit business establishments in the Gold Hill area in an effort to have them join the Gold Hill Chamber of Commerce.

Secretary Cannon reported that 2,711 brochures promoting the area of Gold Hill and Sams Valley have been sent since January 17, 1963 in response to requests for them.

The next meeting and no host luncheon of the chamber will be held Thursday, Dec. 5 at 12 noon at Rogue Riviera restaurant.

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
