PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI) — Oregon State's Mel Counts led his Beavers to their second straight basketball win over Washington State Tuesday night, 75-58.

Counts scored 24 points before he was pulled out of the game with 10 minutes left to play.

Oregon State jumped out in front at the start and was

never headed. It was 45-25 at halftime.

The closest Washington State got in the second half was 14 points.

Following Counts in the scoring column was Frank Peters with 15 while sophomore Scott Eaton added 10 and Jim Jarvis 9 for the Beavers.

Tommy Tommervik Jr., son of one time Pacific Lutheran football star and teammate of WSU Coach Marv Harshman led the Cougars with 12 points.

Delaware Blue Hens Gain National Toga For Small Colleges

NEW YORK (UPI) — The University of Delaware today was named the 1963 national small college football champion by the United Press International Board of Coaches. Delaware is the first Eastern team to win the honors.

Coach Dave Nelson's Blue Hens ripped through their eight opponents—including four major college teams — averaging 36

points a game to rank No. 1 on 18 coaches' ballots.

Delaware totaled 309 points in the ratings to out-clout record-setting Northern Illinois for the title. The Blue Hens wrested first-place from Northern Illinois five weeks ago and maintained its lead the rest of the season.

Northern Illinois was ranked first by eight coaches and accumulated 285 points on the strength of its perfect 10-0 record and the passing wizardry of quarterback George Bork, who shattered nearly every NCAA college passing mark.

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (UPI) — A sleepy coach Jack Christiansen of the San Francisco Forty Niners said Tuesday he was happy about his team's draw in the National Football League draft.

Christiansen was up 22 hours straight through the marathon draw and then managed to take a short nap before Tuesday's workout by his squad.

The coach called Forty Niner one-two draftees Dave Parks of Texas Tech and George Mira of Miami "two of the 10 best players in the country."

Shot In Arm

He also pointed out that the Forty Niners would get a big shot in the arm when Dave Baker returns next year after his Army hitch. Baker is a top-flight defensive back.

His optimism was replaced by worry, however, as he contemplated next Sunday's battle with the Chicago Bears at Wrigley Field. The Forty Niners handed Chicago its only loss, 26-14, in a stunner at Kezar Stadium.

There are other athletes around the state who also will make the quick transition and doubtless will find it difficult to find their maplecourt legs. One other school in the same boat as the Pirates is Camas Valley, the state Class B-8 man grid champ, which is hoop host to Prospect on Saturday night.

Eleven athletes from Coach Jack Woodward's state title football club have turned out for Coach Eldon Durham's basketball squad. Durham, quite naturally is hoping that the championship spirit of the gridiron will carry over into the maplecourt campaign.

TRIUMPH CELEBRATED

Phoenix students celebrated the grid diadem Monday morning with band music and yells for the team at a short assembly. Cup cakes were passed out to team members.

BUSINESSLIKE

"Businesslike, brusque and with hardly any of the social graces, Phoenix brushed aside North Catholic..." That's how Ray Inouye, sports writer for the Portland Oregonian, described the new state champion Pirates in their titanic battle last Saturday with the Royals.

Continued Inouye, "... the Pirates' battle plan was surprisingly simple in outline and straightforward in execution. They coupled an unyielding defense with a multi-form of defense and virtually overpowered the Royals."

And also, "Dismissing for the most part deception, Phoenix telegraphed most of its power punches and got them home anyway."

TRIBUTE

The foregoing is a tribute to the solid, fundamental football as taught by Pirate Coach Jack Woodward and his aides and to the efficiency with which the Buccaneers gridders absorbed their practice field lessons and carried out their chores in games.

DEFENSE TREMENDOUS

"Too much defense."

That's the way Joe Gillis, coach of the North Catholic Royals, summed up Phoenix's victory over his team, for John Nolen, Oregon Journal writer, "That Phoenix defense is everything we heard—tremendous," Gillis told Nolen.

Gillis told Nolen, also, that he thought that the game would have been different had not clipping nullified the touchdown run by NC's Ron Molony off a fumble by the Pirates' Jim Con-sbruck. But, Phoenix Coach Woodward felt otherwise. "Even if they would have scored first," he said to Nolen, "I still think we would have won. I have a lot of faith in this club."

Gillis, to the Ashland Tidings, described Phoenix defense as "almost unbelievable."

SWINNEY OBSERVES

The "qualified observer" we quoted in our Friday advance story of the Phoenix-North Catholic game was Dick Swinney, ex-Medford High and Southern Oregon College griddier. Swinney is on a year's leave of absence from the Phoenix High faculty. On the government grant, he is completing work for his master's degree in counseling at the Portland Continuation Center of the general extension division of the Oregon State System of Higher Education.

He had the opportunity to see North Catholic play on three occasions.

Swinney's scouting information and that of Eldon Durham, Pirate head basketball coach and grid scouting specialist, served Phoenix well, as evidenced by the outcome of the A-2 championship game.

PCL To Open 1964 Season on April 17

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI) — The Pacific Coast League will open its 1964 season April 17, and close Sept. 13, with a 158-game schedule, President Dewey Soriano announced Tuesday.

Braves Get Felipe Alou in Trade With Giants; Hendley, Shaw Go To SF

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI) — The Milwaukee Braves, jubilant upon obtaining star outfielder Felipe Alou from the San Francisco Giants in a fantastic bidding contest, figured today they were in a prime position to win the 1964 National League pennant.

"The trade made us more solid and more diversified than ever before," said Braves Manager Bobby Bragan. "I think we are in the best position to challenge the leaders in several years."

But the Giants claimed the trade should put them on even terms with the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers.

The swap sent Alou, veteran catcher Ed Bailey, pitcher Billy Hoelt and a player still to be named, to the Braves for pitchers Bob Hendley and Bob Shaw, and veteran backstop Del Crandall.

Gave Good Man

"If we had had Shaw with us last year we would have fought the Dodgers for the pennant right down to the closing day," said Manager Alvin Dark of the Giants. "But we gave up a good man in Alou. Every club in the majors was bidding for him."

The key men involved were Alou, Hendley and Shaw. The Braves have been looking for a capable center fielder for years. And the Giants lost out in the pennant race last year for lack of capable pitching.

"Felipe will play center field for us, with Lee Maye in left and Hank Aaron in right," said Bragan. "And don't forget we can play Eddie Mathews in left, too. But the trade gives us a wealth of right-handed hitting power."

Alou, who hit .316 for the Giants in 1962 when they won the
