WASHINGTON (UPI) — Top House Republicans warned today against what they called efforts to make "Americans generally" feel guilty in the assassination of President Kennedy. At the same time they served notice that sorrow at the President's death will not be allowed to impede honest debate and dissent.

## Airman Denies Any Racial Prejudice In Murder Trial

EVREUX, France (UPI)—A U.S. airman denied today that there was any racial prejudice at his barracks where two of his fellow enlisted men are accused of murder.

Airman 1C John Marks of Cranberry, W.Va., testified at the fourth day of the U.S. Army general courtmartial of Pfc. Raymond C. Bost, Jr., Pittsburgh, Pa., and Pfc. Robert Burrell, Philadelphia, Pa. They are two of six defendants, one of them white, accused of unpremeditated murder in the death of Airman 1C Robert Padgett, 23, Woodlawn, Va., who died of a fractured skull a few hours after a fight at his barracks here Sept. 6. Padgett was white.

The defense has alleged that racism was behind the incident. Airman Marks said he confronted a colored soldier who entered the airman's barracks Sept. 6, claiming he was looking for someone.

"Listen, here there has been enough trouble... look at the blood," Marks said he told the colored soldier.

## Christine Keeler Draws Sentence of 15 Months

LONDON (UPI)—Christine Keeler, the call girl who almost toppled the British government, was sentenced today to nine months in prison for perjury and to six months for conspiracy to obstruct justice. The terms will run concurrently.

The red-haired, 21-year-old Miss Keeler whose affairs with former War Minister John Profumo and one-time Soviet intelligence agent Capt. Eugene Ivanov set off Britain's sex scandal, had pleaded guilty to a charge of perjury and one count of obstructing justice.

Her pleas and the sentence came on the second day of her trial for lying about the beating she received last April. She had said Negro jazz singer Aloysius (Lucky) Gordon, one of her boyfriends, had beaten her. Her roommate and housekeeper said the same thing, and Gordon went to jail. But the new evidence freed him and she was indicted.

At today's proceedings her roommate, Paula Hamilton-Marshall, was sentenced to six months for perjury and three months for conspiracy to obstruct justice—with both terms to run concurrently.

Mrs. Shirley Williamson, a Fort Worth housewife, collected \$6,000 for Mrs. Oswald and the children. Secret Service agents who guard the Russian-born woman indicated Mrs. Oswald had received other contributions through the mails.

Mrs. Williamson said she and her husband collected the money for Mrs. Oswald as a memorial to President Kennedy. The Williamsons said they felt the late President would not want the widow left without food or shelter.

## Oswald's Widow Gets Contributions

FORT WORTH (UPI)—The bleak future of Lee Harvey Oswald's widow was brightened today by contributions that exceeded \$6,000 and a deluge of mail from sympathetic Americans.

Mrs. Oswald, 21, has two young children and speaks little English. She was left penniless when the suspected assassin of President Kennedy was slain.
