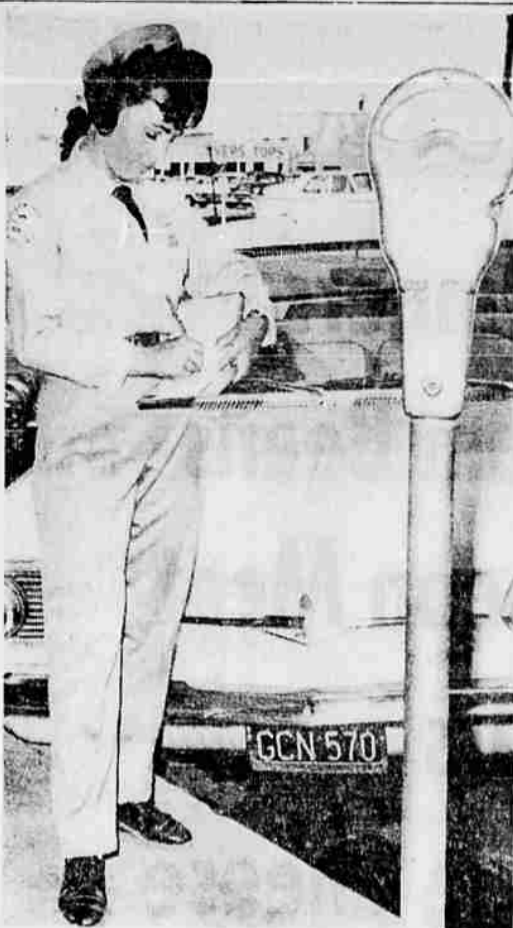
Committee Meeting - The public relations committee for Oregon Collectors Association will meet Dec. 14 and 15 at the Village Green.

Strong Winds Strike Midwest

By United Press International Strong winds bit into the Midwest today. In Missouri and Kansas, plate glass windows were smashed, roofs torn off and power disrupted.

Michigan's upper peninsula shoveled under from six inches of snow and forecasters predicted another two inches before nightfall.

In the eastern Dakotas and northern Minnesota snow depths ranged to 10 inches. There was as much as four inches in northern New England.

Weatherman forecast colder temperatures from the north-eastern great plains and the Mississippi Valley eastward to the Atlantic Coast.

The wind at Kansas City reached more than 60 m.p.h. and many airplanes were diverted from the airport there.

At Topeka, winds reached 75 m.p.h. velocity.

Fire Threat in West Increases

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - Threat of major forest fires in the West is from six to 100 times greater than it was 25 years ago, a leading forest protection official said today.

Keith Arnold, director of the division of forest protection research of the U.S. Forest Service, Washington, D. C., told foresters gathering here for the opening of the 54th annual Western Forestry Conference on Wednesday that the threat of conflagrations is growing faster than fire control agencies can cope with it.

Arnold said that the growing occupancy of forests by people may even be pushing the potentials for conflagrations—really big forest fires to levels 12 to 1,000 times greater than average conditions in the past.

"We now have the capacity to lick all the problems of fire prevention and control except those dealing with conflagration threat," Arnold said.

He said fire-control research and planning are not yet aimed directly at conflagration potential and he urged effort in this direction throughout the West.

Contract Awarded For Kah-Nee-Ta Hot Springs

A \$615,760 contract for construction of public resort facilities at Kah-Nee-Ta Hot Springs on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation in central Oregon has been approved in Portland by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior.

The contract is between the Warm Springs Tribal Council and Stevenson and Wickman, Salem contractors.

The entire \$615,760 will be paid by the tribe. Expenditure of the money was approved by members of the tribe in a referendum vote.

The project will provide modern tourist facilities at Kah-Nee-Ta, a resort area on the reservation which is located along the Warm Springs River near Madras. Included will be a complete rebuilding of the resort's swimming pool, construction of a bath house featuring the warm Kah-Nee-Ta mineral waters, building of seven duplexes containing 28 units, a concession building and parking spaces for 38 house trailers as well as installation of sewage facilities, landscaping and street improvements.

A groundbreaking ceremony will take place Dec. 12 at the project site and construction will begin shortly thereafter.

Another major project scheduled to get under way soon on Warm Springs Reservation is construction of a Community Center building. Groundbreaking for this structure will be held Dec. 13.

BLM Calls for Bids On Two Projects

Two major improvement projects covering approximately 680 acres of public land in Oregon are scheduled by the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior, under sealed bids invited by the Portland office of the Federal agency.

The work involves thinning of timber stand on 380 acres located in Deschutes County, 25 miles south of Bend, and site improvement on approximately 300 acres in Klamath County, southeast of Medford, for reducing existing fire hazards in a burned-over forest area.

Bidders are required to furnish all necessary equipment, materials, supplies, labor, supervision, services and work incidental to both the thinning and site improvement projects.

Bids on Invitation No. 1333 for timber stand improvement will be opened Dec. 18 at 2 p. m. in the Bureau's Field Administrative Office, Room 720, Portland. On Invitation No. 1326 for hazard reduction bids will be opened at the same time and at the same address Dec. 19.

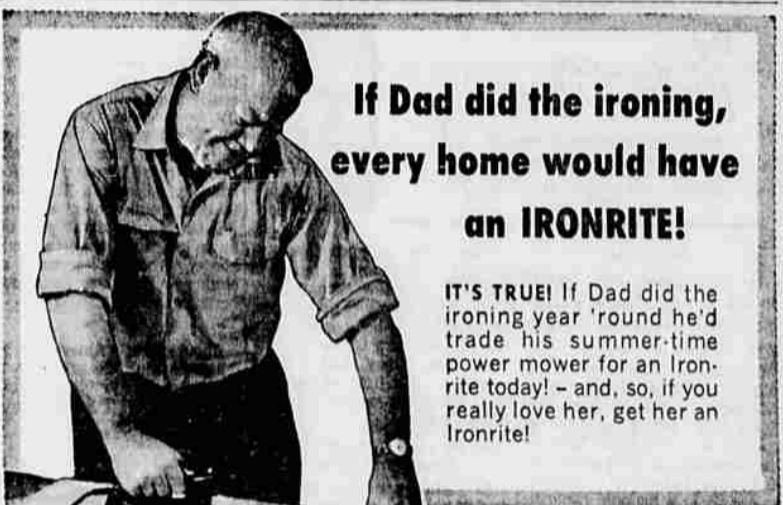
Two Bus Drivers Get Safe Driving Awards

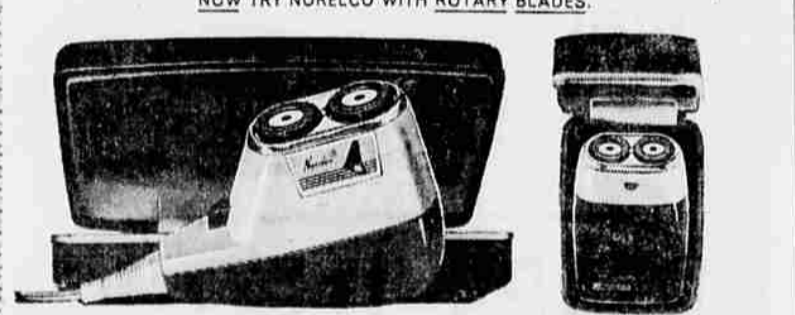
