

Ed Browns's Gamble for Steelers Pays Off, Sets Up Showdown Tilt

Ed Brown gambled and won. So next Sunday he and the Pittsburgh Steelers take on the New York Giants in a winner-take-all showdown to become eligible for the National Football League's \$250,000 jackpot.

The Steelers were desperate Sunday. The clock showed less than five minutes to play and they trailed the Dallas Cowboys, 19-17. The Steelers were on their own 16-yard line on fourth down with 14 yards to go. It was now-or-else, Brown figured.

Sunday to emerge alone atop the Eastern standings with a 10-3 record. Pittsburgh, which has played three ties, is second with 7-3-3.

Since ties are not counted in computing the NFL standings, the winner of next Sunday's Giants-Steelers game will wind up with the highest win-loss percentage and qualify for the championship payoff with its nearly \$600,000-per-man prizes to the winning players.

A tie next Sunday would make the Giants Eastern champs on the same basis. The last time a team won a division title with less victories than the runnerup was in 1949. The Los Angeles Rams won that year with an 8-2-2 record, compared to the Chicago Bears' 9-3.

The Cardinals remained in the running for a playoff berth in Miami by defeating the Philadelphia Eagles, 38-14.

In the Western Division, the Bears stayed ahead of the Green Bay Packers by defeating the San Francisco Forty Niners, 27-7. The Packers beat the Los Angeles Rams, 31-14, on Saturday afternoon. The Bears can clinch the title next

Sunday by beating the Lions, although that would become unnecessary if the Forty Niners upset the Packers next Saturday afternoon.

The Baltimore Colts defeated the Minnesota Vikings, 41-10 in Sunday's other game.

The Steelers overcame an early 9-0 deficit Sunday with the help of Brown's second-period touchdown passes to Buddy Dial and Preston Carpenter, but fell behind 19-17 on Sam Baker's 46-yard field goal and a four-yard touchdown run by Don Meredith in the third period.

Giardello Captures Mitt Toga

CHERRY HILL, N.J. (UPI)—Carmine Tilielli today became manager of Joey Giardello, the brand new world lightweight champion, and when pilot Carmine congratulated Joey upon the deal, the manager found himself talking to himself because they are the same person.

Giardello, who was christened Carmine Tilielli back in 1930 and still lives outside the ring as Tilielli, sent a check for \$10,000 today to his attorney Mike Del Collo in nearby Philadelphia for purchase of his manager's contract from Arman Lorenzi of Philadelphia.

That \$10,000 was a major part of Joey's purse from Saturday's title-winning fight with Nigerian Dick Tiger at the Atlantic City Convention Hall. His purse was estimated at \$12,000.

Arrangements for purchase of the contract were made before 33-year-old Joey won the 160-pound crown from 34-year-old Tiger on referee Paul Cavalieri's 15-round decision, 8-5-2. There are no boxing judges in New Jersey.

As manager-fighter, Tilielli-Giardello notified the press that the "gentleman's agreement" with ex-champion Tiger will be kept and that present plans call for Tiger to get a return shot at the 160-pound diadem in June at New York, Philadelphia or Atlantic City.
