

# Tornadoes Oppose South Eugene Five In Weekend Scraps

A series that "will give a pretty good picture of things." That is how Coach Kuchera of the South Eugene Axemen looks at the two night stand of his basketball contingent here this weekend.

South will oppose the Medford High Black Tornado at 8:15 p.m. on Friday and Saturday at Hedrick Junior High School court.

There will be 6:30 p.m. preliminaries each evening. On Friday the Eagle Point junior varsity will tussle the Medford sophomores. Prospect varsity will take on the Tornado jayvees on Saturday.

South Eugene opened its season on Tuesday against South Salem and won handily 57-36. Medford played last week end with Willamette JV winner 69-68 and Linfield JV victor 77-64.

Pinkstaff Kingpin

Kingpin of the Axemen is John Pinkstaff, 6-7 all-stater and three-year veteran of the club. There are two other lettermen, Dick Shearer, 6 feet and Jack Roche, 5-8. George Myrmo, 5-9, and Bob Coleman, 5-10, may round out the SE starting lineup. Kuchera will bring a squad of 12 players here.

Non-lettermen returnees from the 1962-1963 Axemen squad include Fred Myers, Ed Muth and Don Lawson, a fooler.

Kuchera summed up the outlook for his Axemen this way:

"They have definite possibilities of being a fairly good team."

He said he feels that after a month or so of work the Axemen will be a "representative" club. He reports that the players are hustlers and work hard — two ingredients of successful ball teams.

**New Twists**

Kuchera was pretty well satisfied with the overall first game effort of the Axemen against South Salem, which he termed a green team. But, he stated that the performance did leave a lot to be desired. The coach said that Pinkstaff looked "real good."

On the Medford front Coach Frank Roelandt is "trying to get them ready to go." Offensively, the Tornado has added a couple of new "twists" in effort to get more movement. Time, too, has been spent on defense. Roelandt pointed out that the aim is to get a unit operating that will hit on all five. He commented that the Tornado needs a lot of work.

It is doubtful that Hal Holman will see much action, if he plays at all. He turned his ankle in the Linfield JV game on Saturday and blisters have complicated the injury. Larry Stockman was absent yesterday because of a bad cold. Mike Barnes was back with the squad after missing Tuesday work because of illness.

# 2 Records Established By Koufax

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Fireballer Sandy Koufax of the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers set two records and won or shared four individual titles in 1963 en route to becoming the National League's most valuable player and the major leagues' pitcher of the year.

Koufax' all-around performance was the most glittering of a "pitchers season" — a season in which five NL pitchers won 20 games and five had 200 or more strikeouts. It also overshadowed the magnificent relief pitching of teammate Tom Perrasnoski, whose 812 win-loss percentage was tops in that department.

Koufax set a single-season league mark of 306 strikeouts and set a record for left-handers by pitching 11 shutouts, in addition to winning the earned run average title with 1.88 and sharing the lead in victories with 25. He is the first NL pitcher since Bucky Walters in 1938-40 to win two consecutive ERA titles.

**Other 20 Game Men**

The league's other 20-game winners were Juan Marichal of the San Francisco Giants, 25-8; Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves and Jim Maloney of the Cincinnati Reds, 23-7 each, and Dick Ellsworth of the Chicago Cubs, 22-10. Spahn's 20-win season was the 13th of his career and Ellsworth is the first Cub 20-game winner since 1945.

In addition to Koufax, pitchers who struck out 200 or more batters were Maloney (285), Don Drysdale of the Dodgers (263), Marichal (248) and Bob Gibson of the St. Louis Cardinals (204). Maloney's total was the fourth highest in league history.

Marichal led in innings pitched with 321. Perrasnoski (16-3 for 842) made the most appearances, 69, and Spahn's 22 complete games gave him the leadership in that department for the seventh straight season.

## Ted Ogdahl Urges Pirates To Hit Books Hard, Too; Banquet Honors Champs

PHOENIX—Ted Ogdahl, head football coach at Willamette University, left this serious advice for the members of Phoenix High's Oregon Class A-2 championship football squad last night before concluding a mirth-filled talk at Kim's Restaurant.

"Hit those books just like you hit those opponents," Ogdahl was guest speaker at the Phoenix Lions Club banquet honoring the state champs and their coaches.

The collegiate mentor, who mixed hilarity and seriousness with deft mastery, counseled: "Learn foreign languages . . . study hard . . . go on to college . . . Don't let it pass you by . . . get yourselves ready."

High in his praise of the Pirates and their coaches, Ogdahl pointed to the qualities of character, sharpness and willingness to give a little more than is asked that go into the making of a team such as Phoenix had this season. He maintained that character is built in the home with coaches just developing it a little more on the field. It takes morale, conditioning and desire to play defense like Phoenix played it this season, Ogdahl said.

**Moment of Truth**

One thing in contact sports that is found nowhere else, declared the entertaining Ogdahl, is the "moment of truth" when it is learned whether a player has courage and whether he will give his all for the team. Speaking of the tendency of people generally, he said, "We just don't give our all anymore."

Ogdahl spoke of the feeling of coaches for players who have character, sharpness and willingness to give. "You learn to love these guys," said Oregon's 1960 man of the year in sports. The Willamette man told of the satisfaction that comes to a person who studies hard and gets himself ready for the life ahead.

Pirate Coach Jack Woodward, saying, "We are gathered here to pay tribute to a great team," pointed to the impossible task of singling out players for awards. He announced that, for this reason, no special awards were being made this year.

Woodward reported, as a great thing about his Pirate gridders, that they played together as a team. He described them as a group of stars playing together and said that they all had times when they were best.

**Great Leadership**

Woodward brought out that the Pirates had great leadership in Co-Captains Jon Granby and Ron Williams and the other seniors on the squad, a real good quarterback in Williams, good material and good reserve strength. Discussing the importance of the quarterback to the success of a team, Woodward said that Williams was "a master at finding some place to run and running there."

The mentor reported that the Phoenix second team, going against the first team in practice, was better than any team the Pirates played against this year.

Stating that "this team just didn't happen overnight," Woodward pointed to the contributions of Tom Quinowski and Lewis Bertrand, Talent Junior High coaches; Eldon Durham, as scout and former freshman grid coach; Dick Swinney, now on leave for study, as coach and scout, and of assistants Glenn Alton, Delmar Brood and Hap Consruck. He said that Consruck has not been given the recognition due him.

Woodward reporting that he has had many thrills in his years in football, declared, "My greatest thrill was a week ago Saturday when this team won the state championship."

On that date Phoenix defeated North Catholic 13-0 in the Class A-2 final game. For the Pirates it was their 12th victory of the year. They were unbeaten and untied. They had only one touchdown scored against them all.

The head coach announced the selection of Guard Ken Tyecken and Halfback Jim Consruck as co-captains of the 1964 football team.

One of the highlights of the evening was the reading of "An Ode to the Sly Old Fox of the Rogue," honoring Woodward and his team and reviewing the season of the state champs. The rhyming ode was written by Mrs. Eldon Durham, with her husband, Phoenix head basketball coach, providing the "raw material." Mr. Durham read the ode.

Master of ceremonies for the dinner was E. M. Skipworth, Phoenix High School principal. Elmer Faytinger was banquet chairman.

Jon Granby, on behalf of the squad, presented a "coaches' scrimmage gauge" to Woodward during the year.

## Should NFL Still Play Percentage?

NEW YORK (UPI)—The National Football League wonders whether it should keep playing percentage.

Commissioner Pete Rozelle disclosed that the league's method of computing its standings may be placed on the agenda of next month's meetings in Miami Beach, Fla., "if any club is enough concerned to feel that it merits discussion."

Attention has been turned to the standings because of the possibility that the Pittsburgh Steelers may win the Eastern Division title with two less victories than the New York Giants.

**Three Ties**

The Steelers have played three ties so far this season and should they beat the Giants Sunday they would wind up with an 8-3 record and a .727 percentage that would top New York's 10-4 record of .714.

"This method was set up 30 years ago and it has never caused much interest until this season," Rozelle said.

Under the NFL system, a team which finished the season with one victory and 13 ties would own the same 1,000 percentage as a team which had 12 victories and two ties and a division playoff would be necessary.

Earlier Monday, Rozelle rejected a proposal made by Commissioner Joe Foss of the American League for a "world Series" in 1964 between the AFL and NFL.

## Marv Levy Resigns

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — The University of California was in the market for a new football coach today after the surprising resignation of Marv Levy.

Levy Wednesday night quit his job "in the best interests of the university." In doing so, he gave up a year of his two-year contract.

Director of Athletics Pete Newell called it a "very regrettable decision."

Levy, 38, came to California in 1960 from the University of New Mexico, where his teams had compiled a record of 14 wins and 6 losses.

In the four years under Levy, California annually played one of the nation's most ambitious schedules and wound up with an 82-93 mark.
