

# Alex Petersen Defends Role In Southern Oregon Dispute

ASHLAND, Ore. (UPI) — Dr. Alex Petersen, deposed head of Southern Oregon College's department of physical education, said today he will ask the American Association of University Professors and SOC's faculty council to investigate the school's athletic policies.

ASHLAND, Ore. (UPI) — Dr. Alex Petersen, head of the physical education department at Southern Oregon College, said today he had received word "by campus mail" he was to be relieved of his duties at the end of the current school quarter.

His statement came amid a dispute within Southern Oregon's athletic family which broke into the open Tuesday at an Oregon Collegiate Conference meeting in Portland.

Petersen, who criticized SOC basketball practice and athletic scholarships at the meeting, issued a statement defending his role in the dispute.

### Students Demonstrate

It came after a shouting, placard waving crowd of some 200 students hanged Petersen in effigy on the college campus Thursday night.

President Elmo Stevenson, who had no immediate comment on the reported dismissal, said Thursday night's incident was "regrettable" and that it may have been incited by publicity.

Petersen told the OCC meeting that SOC started basketball practice before the Nov. 1 opening date and charged that athletic scholarships had been issued by coaches instead of an

academic committee. Ted Schopf, SOC athletic director and basketball coach, denied the practice charge, saying one team meeting was held and that other times students got together to practice without his supervision.

Committee Short-Handed Stevenson said some scholarships were given without the entire 10-person committee operating, but that no coach had given

any scholarship or grant on his own. Petersen said he had learned "from a source outside our college in another part of the state that this was apparently in the making" and had requested of the president that "if I was to be relieved, it should be done at this time."

Petersen said, "I have not shied from my responsibility before. I do not now."

## Alabama Downs Miami, 17 to 12

MIAMI (UPI) — Alabama, its offense faltering badly, sent its fastest back 102 yards to the end zone with the opening kickoff Saturday, then scored a touchdown and field goal on Miami fumbles for a 17-12 victory over the late-surgingly Florida Hurricanes.

Miami, fired by passing flash George Mira, scored twice in the final period, but a last-minute drive for a third touchdown was shut off by a pass interception.

The nationally televised game was the last for Miami — and for retiring Miami Coach Andy Gustafson — and Mira, who just missed capturing the national passing championship.

### Record Set

Miami Statisticians said that Mira's 301 yards passing and 23 yards rushing Saturday boosted his season total offense record to 3,228 yards, bettering Don Trull of Baylor, who had 2,278 yards.

This would make Mira the national champion on total offense, and second to Trull on passing among major colleges.

### Ties Record

The magical "Matador" completed 24 passes for 301 yards, enough to boost his career record to 268 completions and tie the major collegiate record of Loyola's Don Klosterman.

The Hurricanes outplayed Alabama offensively, but made too

many mistakes to whip the Sugar Bowl-bound Crimson Tide — obviously hurt badly by the loss of Quarterback Joe Namath, suspended last week for breaking training rules.

The powerful Tide, which tangled with Mississippi Jan. 1 in New Orleans, never got closer than Miami's 23 yard line on a drive.

## UCLA Bruins Take Tilt By 65-55

Friday the 13th was a jinx for the nationally seventh-ranked Oregon State basketball squad, while it was just another day on the calendar for the UCLA Bruins.

The two West Coast powers played an enemy court Friday night with opposite results. Oregon State fell apart at Berkeley, Calif., against the University of California, whose pressing full-court defense forced the usually poised Beavers into ball control errors.

The Bruins won, 65-55, as Cal's Camden Wall outplayed Mel Counts in the battle of big men.

### Bruins Pass Test

UCLA faced a tough test at Lawrence, Kan., where the Bruins tangled with Kansas State and won out, 78-75, as Walt Hazzard hit two free throws, a field goal, and fed a scoring toss to a mate in the final minutes of play.

The flashy guard wound up with 18 points and teammate Gail Goodrich meshed 21. In the other half of the twin bill at Lawrence, Kansas's bumped Southern California, 60-52, as Doug Bolcom had 13 for the Trojans.

The teams move to Manhattan, Kan., tonight and after USC meets Kansas State, the Bruins (3-0) will face Kansas (4-0) in a rugged test.

## Tennessee, Portland KC Winners

PORTLAND (UPI) — Defending champion Tennessee State and Portland moved into the finals of the fifth annual Knights of Columbus Invitational basketball tournament with victories Friday night.

Tennessee State defeated Santa Clara 99-94 and Portland topped Gonzaga 105-100 in first round games of the two-night, four-team tourney.

Willie Porter scored 31 points and Bobby Edmonds tallied 30 to spark the Tigers' victory over Santa Clara and Tom Nichols hit 31 points to pace the Pilots' win over Gonzaga. Porter and Nichols claimed new tournament single-game scoring records with their output.

### Deschaine Has 30

The Broncos' Russ Frankovich collected 25 and the Bulldogs' Elmer Deschaine had 30 in losing causes. Deschaine's 14 field goals also were a tournament record.

Tennessee State and Portland both had to hold off rallies to get their triumphs.

The Tigers led 47-41 at halftime and built up a 67-46 lead with 14:03 left to play but the Broncos came back to cut the lead to 91-86 with 1:39 remaining.

The Pilots held a 54-33 halftime lead and were in front 64-41 with 16:56 remaining but the Bulldogs roared back to trim the lead to 95-90 with 3:51 left to play.

Portland's 105 points and the 205 scored by both teams in that game smashed record established by the other clubs in the night's first contest.

## Panthers Win Game, 33-27

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI) — Quarterback Craig Mueyes tossed two big second-half touchdowns passes Saturday to lead St. John's of Minnesota to a 33-27 win over Prairie View of Texas in the third annual Camellia Bowl.

The victory gave the Johnnies the 1963 NAIA small college football championship. Mueyes, a five foot ten, 175 pound senior, cut loose on scoring aerials of 23 and 19 yards to bring his team from behind to a 14-13 halftime deficit.

The loss cost the Panthers the opportunity of becoming the first Negro team ever to win a National Football championship.

# Packers Keep Hopes Alive In 21 to 17 NFL Victory

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The Green Bay Packers kept their championship hopes alive Saturday with a "long bomb" attack that edged the San Francisco Forty Niners, 21-17.

The Packers now have to depend on the Detroit Lions to defeat the Chicago Bears today to give Green Bay its fourth consecutive Western Division National Football League crown.

## Creighton Wins From Arizonans

Never have so many college basketball leaders fallen in so few days.

The Churchillian paraphrase describes the week's action that hit five of the nation's elite and twice narrowly missed decking top-ranked Loyola of Chicago.

Creighton upset fourth-ranked Arizona State, 84-83, Missouri surprised 10th-ranked Ohio State, 85-74, and California beat No. 7 Oregon State, 65-55, Friday night in an outburst of underdog biting the favorite.

It also marked the second time Arizona State and Ohio State were defeated this week. Second-ranked Duke and No. 3 New York University joined the top echelon members who were beaten in a five-day span.

Phil Silas, the nation's leading rebounder the past two seasons, grabbed off 23 caroms and scored 19 points for Creighton. Bobby Miles, a substitute guard, tallied Creighton's last five points on a field goal and three free throws. Art Becker led the losing San Devils with 25 points.

Undeclared Missouri hit 52 per cent of its shots in stopping Ohio State. The hot-shooting Tigers built a 48-36 halftime lead and only parted with one point of that margin in the last 20 minutes.

Backcourtmen Gary Garner, with 25 points, and Bob Price, with 20 led the Missouri waltz over the Buckeyes. All America Gary Bradds tallied 24 for State, 18 of his points crinkling the nets in the second half.

Niner defense, the Packers took to the air for the victory. Quarterback Bart Starr found Boyd Dowler behind the San Francisco secondary with passes that were good for 53 and 50 yard touchdowns. That spelled the difference.

### Piled Over

The Packers had marched 78 yards to score the first time they got the ball with Tom Moore piling over from the one. But the Forty Niners came back with an 80-yard ground drive of their own featuring J. D. Smith and the veteran Joe Perry. The score came when Smith piled over from the two.

On the ensuing kickoff, Green Bay fumbled and San Francisco recovered on the Packer 23. When this Forty Niner attack stalled on the 15 for some unaccountable reason, the Forty Niners decided to try for a touchdown on fourth down instead of going for a field goal that would have given them a 10-7 lead.

Two minutes after the Packers got the ball, Starr faked and then hit Dowler with his first touchdown bomb.

San Francisco came right back to knot the count at 14-14 when Smith broke over tackle and went 52 yards to score.

### Tied Record

Starr's next bomb to Dowler came in the third quarter and put the Packers ahead to stay. Tommy Davis, who tied the National League record of 156 consecutive conversions with his points after on the second San Francisco touchdown, kicked a 44-yard field goal in the last quarter.

The Packers were 17 point favorites over San Francisco going into Saturday's game. Despite the rugged line play only one penalty was called in the game—a five yarder against San Francisco.

Full back Jim Taylor gained 59 yards for Green Bay to bring his total for the season to 1,010 yards—the fourth consecutive year in which he has gained 1,000 or more.

Starr completed 17 out of 27 passes for 206 yards. Smith carried the ball 19 times for San Francisco and gained 126 yards.

Cuban Fernandez of Miami Beach, who had lost a controversial decision to Argentina's Rivero last Nov. 1, butchered the "little wild bull of the pampas" Friday night in the ring until the bloody bout was stopped at the end of the seventh round.

That Friday - the 13th TKO marked the first time that Rivero had been stopped in his 50

professional fights. Dr. Edwin Campbell administered 16 stitches under his chin and six in his right brow.

Florentino weighed 150 pounds; Rivero, 161.

"It was a magnificent comeback victory for Fernandez," said promoter Markson. "We will use him again on one of the Friday nights in February against some high contender like Dick Tiger, or Joey Archer."

## Pirates Nab Upset Over Norsemen In Junior Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — Tiny Billy White, spunky 134-pound quarterback, guided Orange Coast College to an upset 21-0 victory Saturday over Northeastern Oklahoma A & M in the 18th annual Junior Rose Bowl football game.

The 5-foot-4 Orange Coast quarterback delighted a crowd of 44,044 in the Rose Bowl by completing six of seven passes he attempted in the first half, including a 31-yard scoring pass to end Gary Carr.

The Orange Coast Pirates scored twice in the second period. Halfback Mike Hunter, who pressed White for honors as

player of the game, raced a punt back 53 yards for a touchdown. And in the final minutes of the game, Hunter took a 29-yard pass from reserve quarterback Larry Jones to score his second touchdown.

The victory by Orange Coast gave the California team the national two-year college championship. Both schools had gone into the game with 9-0 records and the Norsemen from Oklahoma were ranked No. 1 in the nation while Orange Coast was listed second.
