Illinois May Free Prisoner After 64

CHESTER, Ill. (UPI) — The last time Richard Honeck spent Christmas outside prison walls he was 20 years old and William McKinley was president of a nation straining to start a new century.

Horatio Alger novels, with their young heroes making quick fortunes by honesty and hard work, were the literary rage.

But Honeck never saw the birth of the 20th Century as a free man. He was sentenced to life imprisonment at Menard Prison here on Nov. 17, 1899, for the murder of his former school teacher.

Friday the Illinois pardon and parole board gave Honeck, 84, the news that surpasses the ending of any Horatio Alger novel: He might be freed from prison before Christmas, after spending 64 years behind bars.

For Honeck, one of 11 children of a Hermann, Mo., blacksmith, the news couldn't have been better. "I'm ready to go," he said when Warden Ross V. Randolph told him of the parole board's decision.

Handolph said the one thing on the prisoner's mind when he was summoned to his office, was whether he would be out in time to spend Christmas as a free man.

"This could be my first Christmas outside the penitentiary in 65 years," Honeck told the warden.

Sen. Dodd Under Guard Following Telephone Threats

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., today is under an around-the-clock guard after a series of telephone threats against his life.

Dodd said that police were assigned to his Senate office and his Washington home. The threats against his life were made by telephone to radio station WTIC in Hartford, Conn.

The Democratic lawmaker said that both the FBI and police in Washington and Connecticut were alerted about a week ago after he received two telegrams and two letters warning that he may be killed.

The latest threat against the one-time FBI man came when a male voice telephoned the station and said: "I know of a plot to kill Senator Dodd." The operator tried to keep the man on the phone, but he hung up, Dodd's office said.

Dodd has been pressing for enactment of a bill to tighten regulations on mail-order sales of guns, such as the sale of the rifle apparently used to kill President Kennedy.

Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., said that a good portion of his mail on the Dodd bill has come from the "nut fringe."

Hart said the letter writers seem to regard the curb on arms as part of a Communist-inspired plot to disarm the nation.

Dodd's bill would bar mail order gun sales to juveniles and felons and expand the data required from all by mail purchases.

Grenades Sent To 'Hate List'

OMAHA, Neb. (UPI)—Investigators today tried to track down four missing hand grenades that may have been wrapped as Christmas gifts and mailed by an ex-convict to persons on his select "hate list."

Police said Richard Carl Nielson, 39, compiled a list of 22 persons living in Omaha, Arizona, Oregon and California who he felt were "responsible for the problems of my family."

Nielson told investigators that he purchased 30 grenades. By today 26 were accounted for

and police feared the other four may already be in the Christmas mails.
