

BEARS, GIANTS CAPTURE NFL CROWNS

Loop Races Decided on Final Day

It will be the Chicago Bears' superb defense against Y. A. Tittle and pro football's most explosive offense in the National League's championship playoff, Dec. 29.

And who could ask for a more dramatic match-up? Although the Bears should be slight favorites for the showdown at Chicago, the New York Giants undoubtedly consider them a refreshing change from the Green Bay Packers, who walloped them two straight years in the title game.

This will be the sixth playoff meeting between the Bears and Giants. No NFL division rivals ever have met as many times. The Bears haven't won a playoff title since 1946—when they beat the Giants. And the Giants' last playoff win was in 1956—when they beat the Bears.

The Bears clinched their 10th Western crown Sunday when Billy Wade took some pressure off the overworked defense by throwing a pair of third-period touchdown strikes that produced a 24-14 victory over the Detroit Lions.

Giants Top Steelers
And the Giants extended their record total of Eastern Division championships to 14 with a 33-17 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in their winner-take-all game in New York.

Both conference races thus were decided on the final Sunday of the season. Chicago finished with a record of 11 wins, one defeat and two ties; the Gi-

ants have an 11-3 record. The Packers and Cleveland Browns wound up in second place to qualify for the Playoff (Runnerup) Bowl game at Miami, Fla., Jan. 5. Cleveland defeated the Washington Redskins, 27-20, giving them a 10-4 record. The Packers edged the San Francisco Forty Niners, 21-17, Saturday to finish with 11 wins, two defeats and one tie.

In Sunday's other games, the Dallas Cowboys upset the St. Louis Cardinals, 28-24; the Baltimore Colts edged the Los Angeles Rams, 19-16; and the Minnesota Vikings trounced the Philadelphia Eagles, 34-13.

Offense vs. Defense
To get an idea of the offense vs. defense battle shaping up in the title playoff games, The Giants scored a total of 446 points during the season, 79 more than any other team in the NFL and 147 more than Chicago. The Bears had opponents to 144 points, 62 less than any other club in the league and 136 less than the Giants.

Sunday's 24-14 score does not adequately tell the role the Bears' defense played in the victory. The defenders held the Lions within range while the Bears' popgun offense could produce only a field goal in the first half.

Wade helped overcome the 7-3 halftime deficit by completing a pair of touchdown passes within three minutes and 21 seconds of the third period. He threw 51 yards to Johnny Morris and 22 yards to Mike Ditka for a 17-7 lead.

The Lions, still full of fight, battled back to score on a fourth run by Terry Barr and then the Bears' defense was called on for its finest efforts to keep Detroit from going ahead. First, the Bears stopped a Detroit penetration to the Chicago 27-yard line. Then, in the final minute, Dave Whitsell intercepted a pass and ran 39 yards for a clinching touchdown with only 25 seconds remaining.

Set NFL Record
Tittle threw three scoring passes against the Steelers to set an NFL record of 36 for a season. Joe Morrison caught two of these and scored another TD on a one-yard plunge.

The two crucial plays of the game, however, were a fumble by the Steelers' Gary Ballman after he had caught a pass and a spectacular one-handed catch of a low pass by New York's Frank Giffard that started the Giants on an important touchdown drive.

Ballman, after catching the pass from Ed Brown early in the game, had the ball knocked out of his hands by Dick Lynch of the Giants. The ball rolled into the end zone, where New York's Erich Barnes picked it up and ran it out 34 yards. Tittle shortly followed with a 41-yard touchdown bomb to Del Shofner.

Giffard made his amazing grab of a 30-yard pass immediately after the Steelers had cut the Giants' lead to 16-10 in the third period. Another 25-yard pass to Giffard and a 22-yarder to Morrison on the next two plays produced a New York touchdown. On the next series of downs, Tittle threw 31 yards to Aaron Thomas, then 14 yards to Giffard and Morrison bucked the final yards for a score that opened a 30-10 lead.

Blew Five Chances
Pittsburgh muffed at least five good scoring opportunities, the Giants intercepting three passes and recovering two fumbles.

Phoenix High Tops Sutherland Bulldogs

PHOENIX — For the second night in a row a big third period helped the Phoenix High basketball team to victory.

The Pirates turned back Sutherland 73-62 here Saturday. It was the second Buc verdict over the Bulldogs and the fourth win against no losses for Phoenix this campaign.

A 28-point rampage in the third canto gave the Pirates a 58-46 lead. Sutherland kept within hailing distance of the Bucs through much of the period. Then, Phoenix went on an 11-point scoring spurt that manufactured a 14-point spread.

The first half was quite a struggle for the home club although it was tied 14-14 at the quarter and led 30-29 at the midway horn. Tense in the early stages, the Pirates missed many good scoring chances. Sutherland was on top by 13-7 in the first panel and by 19-16 and 29-23 in the second. Phoenix had 24-19 and 28-23 bulges.

Barker Scores 20
Phoenix never trailed in the second half but the score was tied at 30-30 before a Danny Beeson jumper gave the Pirates the lead for good. Lead changed hands six times in the first half. John Barker of Phoenix led all scoring with 20 points. Ken Hawkins had 13 and Beeson 12 for Phoenix. Don Goertzen scored 15 points, Larry Johnson 13 and Mike Duelle 12 for Sutherland.

Coach Eldon Durham juggled his lineup much during the first half in effort to get the team running, using 11 players. Rebounding for the game was

almost even with Phoenix having just a 47-46 edge. But, the Pirates had 27-16 command in the second half.

Bench Strong
Pleasing to Durham was the even scoring and the strength of the Phoenix bench. The Pirates got 29 points from non-starters, including Hawkins' 13 and Jon Granby's eight.

Dale Sauer and Jim Consbuck were off their usual scoring game but did a good job directing the offense. Consbuck was instrumental in bringing the ball down court against the Bulldog press, a part of the game in which Phoenix looked weak on the previous week end. Hawkins filled in for Sauer, who was handicapped by fouls, and picked up the scoring slack.

Phoenix hit .352 from the field on 25 of 71 and Sutherland .364 on 29 of 55.

Hawkins, Beeson and Barker paced the third quarter push. Ron Williams got four points, as did Barker in the 11-point spur.

Phoenix ran its margin up to 16 points at 66-50 in the early fourth quarter with Barker and Granby getting points. Sutherland closed to 70-62.

Sutherland won the junior varsity encounter. The Bulldogs fronted 32-30 at the end of the third quarter. Phoenix led 11-4 at the quarter and 22-16 at the half.

Chargers Clinch at Least Tie in AFL West Division

The American Football League race has come up with more possible endings than a ride through the tunnel of love. One playoff already is guaranteed and there may even be two.

The Boston Patriots and Buffalo Bills are tied for the Eastern Division lead so they'll meet in a playoff for the title at Buffalo on Dec. 28.

The San Diego Chargers clinched at least a tie for the Western Division championship by knocking over the Houston Oilers, 20-14, Sunday in a game loaded down with "firsts."

It was the first time the Oilers failed to win the Western Division title since the league was formed in 1960; it was the first time the Chargers ever beat the Oilers in Houston, and it also was the first time the young AFL ever has been faced with the possibility of two play-offs.

St. Johns NAIA Grid Champion

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — St. Johns of Minnesota possessed The National NAIA football championship Monday, but the NAIA itself was without a site for next year's title game.

The Johnnies, behind the clutch quarterbacking of Craig Muiers and spunky play of 5-7 halfback Bernie Beckman, nipped Prairie View A&M of Texas, 33-27 to win the title in the third annual Camellia Bowl Saturday.

Then a few hours later bowl officials announced they would abandon the NAIA championship next year and host an NCAA small college regional playoff instead. The two top small teams from 10 Western states will compete in the bowl.

"Bad Faith"
The sudden announcement prompted Al Duer, NAIA executive secretary, to accuse Camellia Bowl president W. W. Woods of acting in "bad faith" since the affiliation "had to be made some time ago and we were not notified of it."

But Woods said a final decision was not made until after Saturday's game, which drew 12,200 fans, including 10,755 paid. Woods tentatively estimated the bowl association's loss for the game at \$9,000, adding to the \$20,000 it has dropped on the previous two NAIA title contests here.

Woods indicated he hoped Western teams would boost local interest in the bowl. But fans that did attend this year's game couldn't have asked for a more vivid open affair. Scoring plays included a punt return and pass interception and six touchdown passes.

Wyoming Beats UO

EUGENE (UPI) — Wyoming's Cowboys came on strong in the second half to record an 88-61 basketball victory over UO on Saturday night.

The outcome left the Cowboys with a 4-2 record and the Ducks with an 0-4 for the season.

Wyoming ran off 12 straight points to open the second half to take a 48-39 lead after trailing 39-36 at halftime. Oregon led by as many as 11 points in the first half.

Leon Clark scored 25 points and Flynn Robinson tallied 24 for the Cowboys. Steve Jones hit 24 and Steve Barnett had 20 for the Ducks.
