Medford and Grants Pass windup their pre-league schedules. For Medford tonight Coach Frank Roelandt has named a starting combination of players who worked well in the last Saturday game with South Eugene.

These are Steve Davis, Bill Enyart and the quick trio of Jim Allen, Larry Vowell and Mike Barnes.

SHR Limping Bruce Bertrand is still limping from an ankle sprain in practice this week. He'll make the trip with the other 13 players. But, if he plays, it may be only a token appearance on Saturday night.

Griffith, Carter in Ring Bout

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — On the coldest December 20th in Pittsburgh's history, the snow-floored city will be treated tonight to what shapes up as a red hot fight between world welterweight champion Emile Griffith and top middleweight contender Rubin (Hurricane) Carter.

Griffith's 147-pound title will not be at stake in this nationally televised 10-rounder at the Civic Arena, but his prestige as "Fighter of the Year" and his hopes for a shot at the middleweight (160-pound) crown will be hanging on every punch.

His prestige will plummet and his middleweight hopes will drop to zero — the temperature outside — if he loses.

Risks Chances Pittsburgh's Dec. 20 record of four above zero was established in 1884.

Sluggish Carter of Patterson, N.J., also will be risking his chances of soon challenging middleweight ruler Joe Giardello.

Griffith, 24, of New York, is favored at 2-1 to beat the 26-year-old Carter because of his speed, ruggedness and combined boxer-puncher proficiency, and because of the success pattern in Emile's three latest bouts — two with middleweight contenders.

Duke Led By Mullins

Jeff Mullins, the "other guy" on the Duke basketball team last season, has developed into the Blue Devils' "big guy" this season.

Not that Mullins was any slouch last year, finishing with a 20.3 per game average, but he usually played second fiddle to spectacular teammate Art Heyman.

Heyman has since graduated to the pros, leaving the field open for Mullins to fully demonstrate his abilities.

Mullins put on another brilliant show Thursday night, pouring in 30 points to lead fourth-ranked Duke to an 84-73 victory over Virginia at Durham, N.C.

It was the second time this season Mullins has scored 30 or more points in a game. He is chiefly responsible for the Blue Devils' 6-4 record.

The hurling 6-4 senior was on the spot when needed most and personally turned back a determined Virginia rally by scoring eight straight points after the Cavaliers had narrowed the Duke lead to 40-46 early in the second half.

Full Squad Drills Will Begin Saturday For Oregon Webfoots

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI) — The University of Oregon will begin full squad workouts Saturday in preparation for its Sun Bowl game against Southern Methodist at El Paso, Texas, Dec. 31.

Only 22 players were on hand in an informal workout Thursday because the school is in the midst of fall term examinations.

The Ducks worked on passing and quarterback Bob Berry was on target throughout.

Another light drill was scheduled today.

The Ducks will perform in the Sun Bowl without the brilliant Mel Renfro at halfback. He recently inked a contract with the Dallas Cowboys of the National Football League after being declared out of the Sun Bowl game anyway because of a severe hand injury.

Phoenix Basketeers Play Myrtle Creek

PHOENIX — Phoenix High's basketeers, sixth rated in the A-2 schools of the state, shoot for their fifth straight win of the season with just one appearance on the mapleboards this weekend.

Myrtle Creek, Umpqua Valley League champion for the past two seasons, will be the Saturday night adversary of the Pirates. The Vikings reportedly will carry a 2-2 rating into the skirmish against undefeated Phoenix.

On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the Pirates went through three of the longest and toughest workouts Coach Eldon Durham has conducted at Phoenix. He hopes that the drills will show Saturday evening in improvement in the Buccaneers' overall game.

The week's practices were completed with a light workout yesterday and Durham gave his charges today off from the court.

Little Parts of Game The three tough drills have been aimed at little parts of the game where the Pirates have been lacking. Work has been done on out-of-bounds plays, on offense against a full court press and the Pirates own pressing defense game. Drill also has been toward improving defense against certain situations.

Durham indicated the Phoenix starters will be picked from among Jon Granby, Dan Beeson, John Barker, Ron Williams, Ken Hawkins, Jim Consbrock and Dale Sauer. Eugene Hill and Lex Hamilton, who have had starting assignments are expected, also to see a lot of service.

Durham said that players are enthusiastic over the rating accorded them. The coach said he feels that the Pirates deserve it, that they are doing a good job and are showing that it is just.

If Coach Hank Tallis's Myrtle Creek Vikings follow the pattern of the past couple of seasons, they'll present a ball court offense, which has the objective of working for good shots and a sound man-to-man defense.

It appears that the Vixs will have no great height in their starting lineup. The crew could be Jerry Wilson, 6'5, Tony Quinn, 5-10, and Bob Fuller, Larry Pringle and Bob Beamblossom, each 5-11. Myrtle Creek does have a 6-2 player in Dan Billings, a sophomore.

MC's likely starters all are seniors. Quinn, Fuller and Pringle are returnees from the 1962-1963 squad. Jim Billings, 6 feet, is another letterman in Beanblossom, who has junior varsity experience. Wilson is a transfer. A sophomore who has seen duty is Dennis Birenbaum, 5-9.

Myrtle Creek's record include a win over Myrtle Point and two losses to Gold Beach. Available records do not show the other team the Vikings beat.

The Saints of Eugene are ambitious to improve on a poor 1962-1963 season. Hummel, who coached at St. Mary's nine years ago is looking for a pretty good year this time in the Emerald League of A-2 schools.

Shooting was a problem last year and St. Francis accuracy for the basket looks improved, Hummel has reported.

He said, "We'll probably hold our own if we keep working."

Hummel does not platoon his Saints but he makes liberal use of 10 men and thereby sort of keeps his maplecourt forces fresh.
