Johnson Having Lumber Labeling Pressure Exerted

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson is being urged both to sign and to veto a bill requiring the labeling of imported lumber to show the country of origin.

A veto was urged editorially by the Washington Post, which said the "clear purport" of the legislation was to erect new barriers against imports.

However, Rep. Jack Westland, R-Wash., sent Johnson a telegram urging him to sign the measure to help the domestic lumber industry compete with Canadian producers.

The editorial urging a veto said lumber marking provisions of the bill were the "handiwork" of Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee.

The legislation would require the marking of Canadian lumber to show its origin. It would withdraw an exemption from such marking requirements extended to Canadian lumber in 1948.

Pacific Northwest lumbermen have complained that they are losing U.S. East Coast markets to British Columbia. Their chief complaint has been that the Canadians can ship lumber to the U.S. coast aboard lower-cost foreign ships, while U.S. shippers must use higher-cost American flag vessels.

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"Certainly Canadian lumber interests have enough advantage over American lumbermen in their own market without our continuing the practice of allowing imports unmarked as to country of origin," Westland said.

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Multnomah Jury Finds Murder Guilt

PORTLAND (UPI)—A Multnomah County Circuit Court jury found George Jones, 67, guilty of second degree murder Thursday night.

Jones was convicted in December, 1962, of the skidrow stabbing of Robert Bowman, 33, here, but the Oregon Supreme Court recently overturned the verdict and ordered a new trial.

The case went to the jury earlier Thursday.

Immediacy Stressed In Completion of Resort Facilities

ASHLAND—"Christmas is the season of greatest ski interest," Buck Martin, winter sports director of the Mt. Ashland Ski Resort, said Tuesday when he addressed members of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce at their final luncheon meeting of the year in the Mark Antony Hotel.

Martin emphasized the immediacy of completion of facilities so that holiday crowds may be accommodated. Although the lodge is usable in the two lower floors the four-story towered building looks like a fort with its windowless walls, he said.

The warming area is ready and it is expected that the cafeteria will be operating on a limited basis within a week or 10 days. Rest rooms also are completed and water was to be running by Wednesday when the generator would be installed.

Power was anticipated by the week end as Pacific Power and Light Company has been working double and triple shifts to complete the installation.

The ski director reported that the sports shop is open and fully equipped. The T-bar with wooden seat for two and a 900-passenger per hour capacity is operating at 11 a.m. and the pomalift, ordered from France and side-tracked in a New York warehouse, has arrived and will be immediately installed.

The runs are now cleared and skiable and have been well

packed. Last week Martin said 60 or 70 skiers went up for Sunday's sports. Five full time instructors will be on hand and 15 are being trained for assistance.

Road conditions are the biggest problem and are dependent largely upon the weather. Alternate freezing and thawing plus constant heavy truck and tractor traffic has made the approach difficult. Crews are working from both ends of the access road from the summit on U.S. 99 and the resort and will meet at the Rocky Point location where the final fill is to be made.

It is possible to use Tolman

Creek Road to the area unless it is ordered closed by the Forest Service because of weather conditions. Inspection is scheduled this week end.

The speaker declared that Mt. Ashland has enormous potential, not only as a recreational area, but as an economic asset to Ashland.

Bill Patton, retiring president of the chamber, presided over the Tuesday luncheon meeting and the speaker was introduced by Dr. Stewart Johnson.

Duane Baker announced that the annual Awards Banquet will be held Jan. 20 and that Gov. Mark Hatfield has been secured as the speaker. The

place of meeting is as yet undetermined. At the Jan. 7 meeting Justice of the Peace Frances Gallatin will talk on traffic problems and the following week, Jan. 14, Dr. Leo vanDijk will be installed as president for 1964.

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Kennedy Family Wishes Observed

PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Police Secret Service agents are seeing to it that Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy and her two children are not bothered by anyone but Santa Claus.

Agents at the gates of a villa lent to the family by C. Michael Paul and on the telephones are kindly informing callers the family wishes seclusion for the holidays.

But Santa will be welcomed to the two homes to leave gifts for the Kennedy children.

John Jr., 3, and Caroline, 6, will rip the wrappers off presents early Christmas morning and then will ride about a mile north to the home of their grandfather, former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy.

A private Christmas Mass will be said in the elder Kennedy's home, followed by the exchange of more gifts. Grandfather Kennedy has picked out some "special gifts" for the two children, said Ann Gargan, the companion and niece of Joseph Kennedy.

The ailing former ambassador has been confined mostly to a wheel chair because of a stroke two years ago. But he was planning to swim almost daily with his grandchildren, a family spokesman said.

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Wallace Schedules Eugene Talk Jan. 13

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI)—Gov. George Wallace will speak the evening of Jan. 13 at the University of Oregon in Eugene, his office said Thursday.

Wallace's speech is one of several he is making on a Far West tour next month.

He is scheduled to fly to Portland from Los Angeles on Jan. 12 and hold a news conference at the Hilton Hotel in Portland Jan. 13 at 10 a.m., after which he travels to Eugene. He also plans a 3:30 p.m. news conference in Eugene on that date.

He flies to Seattle from Eugene the night of Jan. 13, his office said.

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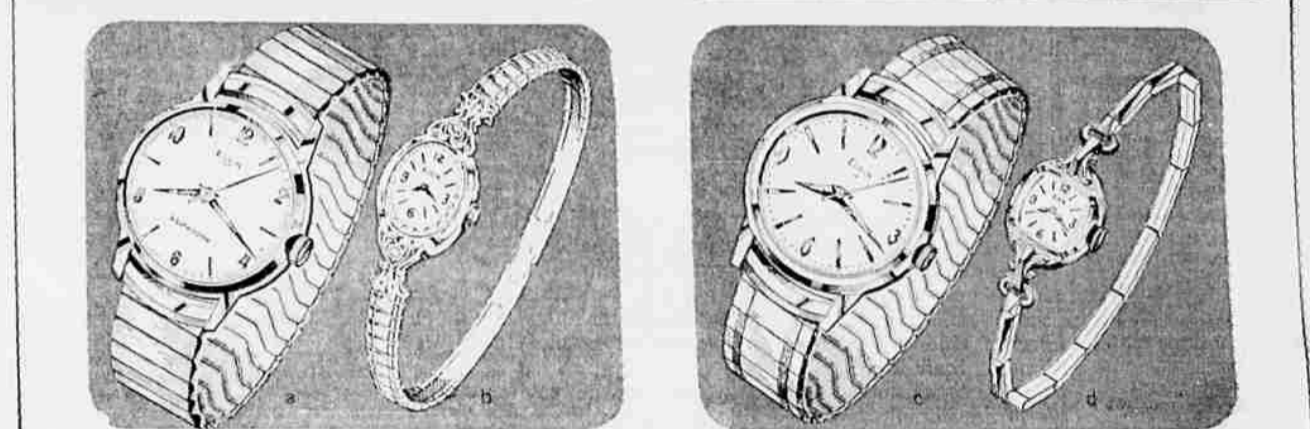
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
