Use a regular paint brush and make designs on cookies before baking.

Here is a brand new idea in cookie making, using an unusual ingredient that is becoming quite popular for new and different recipes, old-fashioned popcorn. Creative cooks are finding more and more uses for this native American delicacy, from stuffing fowl to cocktail canapés. One of these which is a treat for youngsters as well as adults is Popcorn Macaroons, pictured above.

Popcorn Macaroons Make Inexpensive Party Dish

Now, in less than an hour, you can have gay party-time Popcorn Macaroons, not just a few, but four dozen of these light tasty, crunchy treats and for less than seven cents cost of ingredients.

It may sound unbelievable but it's true.

Here is all you do, use one-eighth cup hullless popcorn pop it, according to directions on the package. For best popping results, use popcorn that is of well-known quality, and comes in air-tight cans to keep it at the peak of popping perfection.

Lightly salt the popped corn. It is delicious to munch on while the cookies are baking, so you may as well pop a little extra.

Beat two egg whites until stiff. Beat into the egg whites, two-thirds cup of sugar, one tablespoon at a time. Fold in the popped popcorn. Spoon popcorn, egg-white and sugar mixture into a piece of brown kraft paper. Bake at 300 degrees for 35 minutes, or until egg-whites are dry.

Hint, egg whites collapse, so after beating, don't put off, get them into the oven as quickly as possible.
