

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., reported in the Senate today his 1962 net income was \$9,585 on a gross of \$69,247. His estimated property assets, in 1961, in farm holdings totaled between \$388,000 and \$438,000.

Morse made public his own income and assets in a Senate speech during action on legislation to require such public disclosure by top federal officials and national political committee officers. He emphasized he has been introducing such measures since 1946.

After 17 years, he told the Senate, public and press alike would have no interest in the conflict of interest problem "were it not for the headline-making activities of one former Senate employee" — ex-Democratic Secretary Robert G. (Bob) Baker.

Not Making Scapegoat  
"I am not interested in making a scapegoat of one man, of seeing him pilloried with the idea that all the conflicts of interest within the congress will be forgotten when his case is finished," said Morse. The current Rules Committee inquiry into the Baker "outside interest" case must "not be the end of the matter," he said.

Detailing his own financial picture, Morse reported that in addition to his Senate salary of \$22,500, he received in 1962 a total of \$10,044.01 in lecture fees, \$5,000 for his service as "impartial chairman" of the National Electrical Benefit Fund of the National Employees Benefit Board, and \$27,512.61 in gross farm income.

He said he also received \$422 in interest and \$3,439.28 in "other" amounts for official travel, office and communication allowances.

From his \$60,347.00 of income he deducted \$50,862.28 in expenses for farm operation, depreciation, Senate cost-of-living allowance, official travel, personally-paid office items and federal income tax withholding payment, for a net of \$9,585.02.

He pointed out that he also has such "incorporeal" assets as his wife and family, and the trust of Oregonians who have elected him four times to the Senate.

The most valuable property asset listed was his 20-acre farm on the edge of Eugene, Ore., on which he estimated the market value at \$200,000 to \$250,000.

Investment in Farm  
He said his investment in this farm, owned for 40 years, is between \$60,000 and \$70,000, and that its substantial increase in value results from its proximity to the growing city of Eugene, which now has "grown around three sides of the farm."

The Morse family's second farm at Prosser, Ore., near the Washington, has an estimated market value of about \$70,000, he said. In this 74-acre property he said he has a total investment of about \$50,000, not including taxes since 1957.

The Public Library of Medford and Jackson County will be closed for Christmas observance from noon Dec. 24 through Dec. 25. This decision was reached at the December meeting of the Library Trustees.

Reports presented at the meeting showed that home use of books increased by 12 per cent at the library during November.

Circulation increased from 25,227 to 28,719 books.

Highest increases were in the Phoenix and Jacksonville branches and the Medford Junior Department. Phoenix registered a 52 per cent increase; Jacksonville a 33 per cent increase, and the Junior Department a 25 per cent increase.

The grand total showed home use of books increasing from 198,652 books to 217,253 books.

The library users increased by 185 for the month. Total registered borrowers is now 21,078.

The library added 1,612 books, records and pamphlets during the month.

Other library activities reported included the use of the public meeting room by 19 groups, the sending of 24 book collections to school libraries, and 12 school class visits to the library.

The Library Trustees approved painting specifications for the headquarters library and the purchase of a microfilm reader.
