Safety Rules For Yuletide Are Enumerated

BOSTON (UPI) — Five rules for combatting Christmas season fire hazards have been suggested by the National Fire Protection Association.

Here they are:

- When selecting a tree, choose a fresh one. Stand the tree in water from the time you buy it until you dispose of it. Don't rely on chemical preparations to "flame - proof" your tree.
- Decorative lighting should be used with care. Check lighting strings before using for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets. Never use wax candles on or near the tree, or with polystyrene foam candle holders or decorations. Turn off tree lights before retiring or leaving the house.
- Use noncombustible decorating materials wherever possible.
- Dispose of gift wrappings promptly.
- Be extra careful about smoking near the tree.
