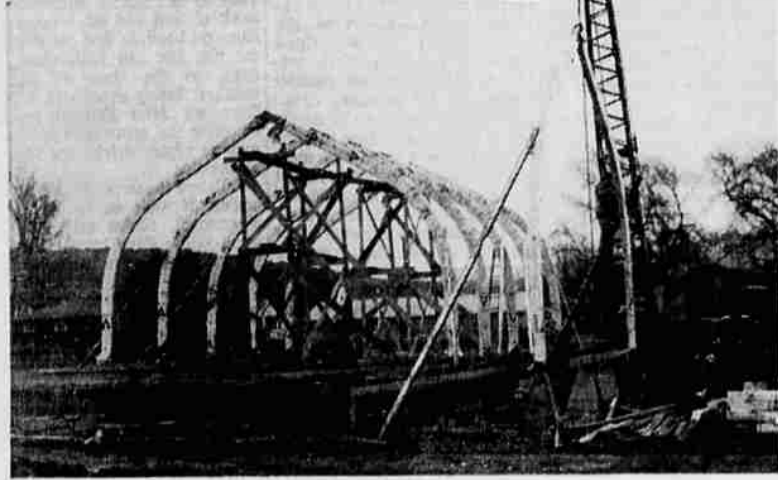

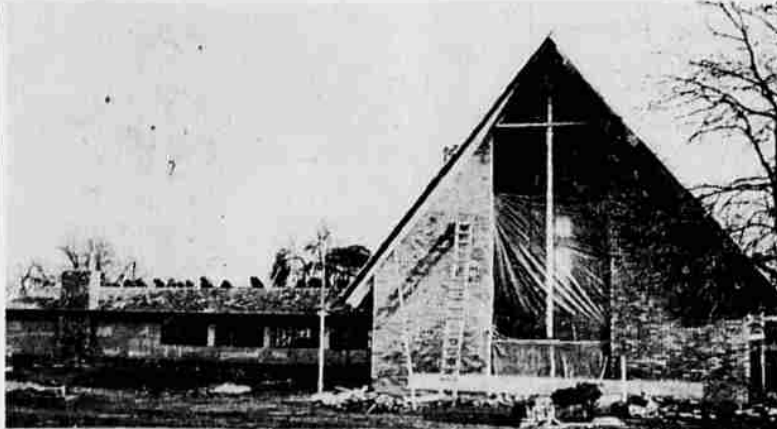

### Inquiry Forum Scheduled To Begin Monday Evening At St. Mary's School Gym

An inquiry forum for persons who would like to learn about and discuss the teachings and practices of the Roman Catholic religion is scheduled to begin on Monday, Jan. 6, at 7:30 p.m. in the annex of the St. Mary's Grade School gymnasium, 11th and Holly Streets.

The series of informal meetings will be conducted by the Rev. Gilbert Lulay, assistant pastor of Sacred Heart Church and will continue twice weekly approximately until Easter. The night of the second and following meetings will be determined by those present at the first session on Jan. 6.

Father Lulay also announced that if a desire and need for it is indicated, an afternoon meeting schedule will be set. Individual sessions will be available for those who find it impossible to attend any of the group meetings.

As a guide for discussion the booklet "Life in Christ" will be used. It was written by the Rev. Gerard Weber, priests of the Chicago Archdiocese where much pioneer work has been done in the field of inquiry forums and similar means of bringing knowledge and understanding of the Catholic Church to others. Copies of the book will be available at the meetings.

It is not necessary for anyone to pre-register before attending the Forum nor is it required to be present at the complete series. Father Lulay emphasized that no obligations of any kind are imposed upon those taking part and no charges are made.
