

Central Washington Cagers Top Southern Oregon 87-81

ASHLAND — Surging ahead to stay on the clutch scoring of Jim Clifton, and using free shots to pad the margin a n d w i t h -stand Raider rally efforts, Central Washington College basketball team clipped Southern Oregon College 87-81 here last night.

The Ellensburg, Wash., aggregation fell behind Southern Oregon by nine and eight points in the first half but never trailed after once going on top in the second. CWC rolled up 11 points while SOC went scoreless at the outset of the second 20-minute session. That gave the Washingtons the lead by five counters. They expanded the spread to eight points then had to break away from a 65-61 deadlock before assuming permanent charge.

Central turned in a steadier, surer overall performance, had a 13-rebound advantage on the backboards and cashed in on free line opportunities to win it. Southern Oregon had more field goals and matched the Washingtons in full-game shooting average but encountered difficulty in connecting when in desperate need of goals.

Cox Scores 32

Brownie freshman Mel Cox of CWC marshaled the parade of scoring with 32 markers, Clifton had 22. For the Raiders Jack McWhorter netted 27 and Royce Kiser 23.

The conflict had entered its final 10 minutes when a basket by SOC's Paul Munson pulled the clubs even at 65 apiece. However, Clifton hepped a long jumper and a pusher from the side for 69-65 to halt SOC's upward climb.

Bill Franks goaled from the top of the circle for the Raiders, Cox tallied from the free stripe. After a McWhorter bucket off a Franks pass, the Washington again was 70-69. But, Clifton again came to the rescue with a pair of goals for 74-69. Then, he traded goal for goal with McWhorter. That was the last field counter for CWC. Its final 11 points were from the free line. And, the victory would have been a bigger difference had the visitors hit better on second charity chances.

With the score 78-73 and around three minutes left, Central turned to ball control. SOC fouls enabled the Washingtons to stretch to 82-73. Baskets by Tom Bernet and Charles Pomeroy gave the Raiders a ray of hope. But, five more gift throws provided CWC its widest gap — 10 points — at 87-77. Goals by

SOC's Jerry Shults and Dick Deffley closed out the point-making in the game.

Cox, Buss Wreck

Southern Oregon went in to the second half with a 43-37 budge. Tabulations by Cox and Roger Buss destroyed the SOC command. Cox chalked up a goal and a gift heave. Buss roped two long jumps. Cox scored on a Clifton feed and then, all alone under the hoop, took a Dale Hall pass for another basket. This made it 48-43.

Mike Shaver collected a couple of singleton free shots for the Raiders but a Cox field bucket and Hall free toss established 51-45. McWhorter and Buss exchanged goals. Kiser hit a long push for SOC and McWhorter scored on a Franks feed for 53-51.

Next, for Central Cox and Clifton hit from the field and Bob Moawad from the free line for 58-51.

Eight Points Apart

McWhorter swished a driver but a Clifton gifter and a Cox tip made the span eight points at 61-53. An exchange for the Raiders but a Cox field bucket and McWhorter's trade of two free shots for Hall's rebound goal left a 65-57 standing. Kiser's two free heaves, McWhorter's rebound basket, Shults' push and Munson's tip brought the game to 68-61.

After three lead switches in the early action, SOC ran up a 21-12 span. The Ellensburg gang caught up at 27-17 and took the lead at 31-29 on a short jump by Hall. McWhorter's push and Kiser's shot from the side off a Shults pass made it 33-31 for SOC. Central tied at 33 and 35 but free points by Kiser and field swishes by McWhorter, Shaver and Shults fashioned the midway gap.

Central Washington had a 51-38 difference on the backboards with Hall getting 13, Buss 10 and Cox nine retrieves. Kiser and McWhorter cleared 12 rebounds each for SOC.

27 of 43 Gitters

The visitors put in 27 of 43 free tosses to SOC's 13 of 21. SOC shot 34 of 77 from the field for 442 and CWC 30 of 68 for 441.

The Raiders' Munson sat out the late first half and early second because of four fouls. He then fouled out just after CWC went in front for good. SOC also lost Bill Franks on fouls and the Washingtons lost Hall.

The Washington team's leading scorer, Dale Hutsell, was under the weather and, although

Sun Devils Nip Indians By 61-60

The remarkable basketball streaks of Arizona State and Oregon State were endangered Monday night, but both teams kept them alive.

Arizona State had won 51 straight home court games going into Monday night's contest with Stanford. The Indians were crippled by the loss of center Tom Dose because of a knee bruise. Doctors say the brilliant Indian star has only an "outside chance" of playing in the Indians' weekend Big Six opening series against Southern California.

But the rest of the Indians played the game of their life before losing to the Sun Devils, 61-60. A tip-in shot by Joe Caldwell at the buzzer decided the issue.

Stanford led 57-49 with about four minutes to go, but then lost the range. Caldwell scored 23, while Kent Hinckley and Clayton Raaka had 20 and 18 for the Cards, who took their first loss of the year.

Oregon State was participating in its eighth Far Western Classic and had yet to lose a contest in the tourney going into Monday night's final against Brigham Young.

Brigham Young led 49-39 in the second half, but then center Jim Fairchild fouled out with 12:07 to go. The Beavers promptly outscored the Utah quintet in the next seven minutes and went on to a 63-58 win.

Latest UPI ratings placed unbeaten UCLA second and unbeaten Oregon State eighth to give the West Coast two of the nation's top 10 teams. Stanford was placed 12th and University of San Francisco drew one vote.

In other action Monday night, Arizona lost at Bradley, 67-59. Al Johnson had 14 for the Wildcats, who led until the late stages of the contest.

Other scores: Hawaii 76 San Diego Marines 77 (overtime), St. Martin's 77 Pacific (OP) 76, Central Washington 37 Southern Oregon 31.

Beavers Come From Behind To Defeat BYU, Win Tourney

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) — Oregon State's once-beaten Beavers today looked ahead to a weekend series with Cincinnati after capturing their eighth straight Far West Classic basketball championship Monday night.

The Beavers posted their 10th win in 11 starts and sixth straight victory by coming from behind to defeat Brigham Young 66-58 in the finals of the classic before a record crowd of 13,012 persons.

Oregon State, which now has won 21 straight games in taking the tournament every year since its start in 1956, plays Cincinnati here Friday night and at Corvallis, Ore., Saturday night.

The Beavers walloped the Beavers 80-46 in the NCAA semifinal last winter.

Counts MVP

Seven-foot Mel Counts scored 24 points and collected 16 rebounds for Oregon State against Brigham Young. He was voted the most valuable player in the four-day, eight-team tournament.

But the Beavers' victory didn't come easily—and not until 6-8 center John Fairchild of the Cougars fouled out.

Brigham Young was ahead by 11 points in the second half and held a 49-39 lead when Fairchild was called with his fifth foul with 12:07 left to play.

Oregon State then outscored the Cougars in the next seven minutes to take a 53-51 lead and never was headed.

Counts, who poured in 48 points in an opening round victory over Louisiana State Thursday night, made 13 of his 24 points after Fairchild fouled out.

Jim Jarvis scored 19 points and Rick Whelan tallied 12 for the Beavers, who held a 29-27 halftime lead.

For the Cougars, Fairchild had 16 and Steve Krametz made 14.

All Stars

Named to the tournament All-Star team with Counts were Fairchild, Jarvis, Steve Jones of Oregon and Charlie Williams of Seattle.

Counts' performance of 48 points allowed him to break the tournament scoring record with 89 points in three games. The old mark was 76 set by Oregon's Charlie Warren in 1961.

Huskies, Illini Both Stress Ground Attack and Defense

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—Washington's Huskies, who made it into Wednesday's Rose Bowl game on the strength of a running attack built around the fullback position, received a belated Christmas present with the news that their No. 1 boy, Junior Coffey, might see action against Illinois after all.

Husky hopes for a victory in the New Year's Day football classic received a jarring setback Dec. 21 when it was announced that Coffey had broken a small bone in his left foot and would miss Wednesday's game.

But five days later it was announced that Coffey's break was not as serious as believed at first and that the jarring 201-pound line-smasher might be available for use against the Illini.

Coffey missed the first four games of the 1963 season but injuries to his right foot Washington lost three of those contests.

Impressive Statistics

During the season, Coffey gained 390 yard rushing, a 4.3 yard per carry average, and was a unanimous first-team choice on the UPI All-Coast team.

Even if doctors have to revise their opinion at the last minute and decide that Coffey can't play against Illinois, the situation might not be as disastrous as would seem at first glance.

For oddly enough, Washington also boasted the No. 2 fullback on the West Coast in UPI balloting — Charlie Browley. He will step in to replace Coffey Wednesday if the Dimmitt, Tex., tornado is unable to play.

Browning had some very impressive statistics of his own during the regular season, including an average of 5.0 yards per carry.

The Huskies also have one other break going for them Wednesday. Two players who missed most of the season because of injuries or illness are apt to see a lot of action against Illinois.

Battle Back

Quarterback Bill Siler and guard Rick Sortum managed to battle their way back to the second string during the pre-bowl game practice period which began Dec. 16.

Siler, originally Washington's No. 1 quarterback, played only one game during 1963 because he came down with hepatitis during the second week of the season. Bill Douglas took over for Siler and guided the Huskies the rest of the way.

Sortum was injured in the Stanford game in mid-season and hasn't played since.

Other Washington standouts to watch for tomorrow include All-America guard Rick Redman, his opposite number at the other guard position, Koll Hagen, and halfbacks Ron Medved and Dave Kopay.

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)—

It's unlikely that Rose Bowl fans will see anything Wednesday resembling last year's high scorin scrap that kept them on the edge of their seats to the final second.

Illinois, the Big Ten champion, is a grind-it-out club with a grudging defense which forces its opponent to play the same kind of game.

During the regular season, Illinois ran about three plays for every pass, scoring 15 touchdowns rushing and only three on passing, and Coach Pete Elliott expects to play Washington in the same fashion.

"We can't change," he said. "I just hope that our execution will be good and that we can play up to our normal form."

Short On Drills

The Illini had five days of indoor drills at home before coming to California, and Elliott complained that the sight-seeing and entertainment schedule left him only one day for double drills.

"But maybe the lack of work won't hurt us too much," he said. "It'll give us a chance to get over our bumps and bruises."

Quarterbacks Mike Taliferro and Fred Custardo spark the Illini attack with fullback Jim Grabowski the power threat and halfbacks Sam Price and Jim Warren the speedsters.

Grabowski, a sophomore, led the club in rushing with 81 yards and a 4.2 average, but Custardo, who passed 53 times and ran 43, led the club in the average with 5.7. Taliferro ran 43 times also for a 3.7 average and passed 79 times.

Cigarettes Unimpressive

The Illini passing gained only 702 yards compared to 1,732 yards rushing and completed only 38 of 155 attempts for a 42.9 completion percentage.

Neither figure is impressive considering the offensive averages of many college teams, but the Illini defense was so good that it helped the attack produce a 7-1 record for the regular season.

Led by Dick Butkus, a burly and fast linebacker, and a backfield of George Donnelly, Mike Dundy, Warren and Tom Fearn, the defense intercepted 17 passes and recovered 18 fumbles by the opponents for 35 turnovers which made some scores come easy.

Washington holds a three game winning streak over Illinois, including victories in both 1961 and 1962, but the two clubs have a 3-3 record for their six previous games.

'Wildcat' Teams Score Impressive Wins In Tourneys

Prospects offered no hope of a settlement today for a wildcat strike which hit four of the nation's college holiday basketball tournaments Monday night when Kentucky, Davidson, Villanova, and Kansas State walked off the court with impressive victories.

Unbeaten Kentucky, the top cat of the college basketball world, routed Loyola of New Orleans, 80-64, in the opening round of the Sugar Bowl Tournament. Cotton Nash scored 28 points as the No. 1 ranked Wildcats clawed their way to victory number nine.

Kentucky, which had to fight from behind in the first half, will meet ninth-ranked Duke tonight for the title. The Blue Devils, with Jeff Mullins scoring 23, had to battle from a 40-31 halftime deficit to defeat defending champion Auburn.

Davidson, No. 7 in the country, d r u b b e d Pennsylvania, 90-73, in the first round of the Charlotte Invitational. The Wildcats from North Carolina shot 58.6 from the field, slightly better than their tops-in-the-nation percentage of 57.5.

In the other semifinal pairing, Princeton stunned Texas, 84-71, as Bill Bradley tossed in 46 points in a frantic one-man show. Bradley, one tiger who is worth his weight in wildcats, a l m o s t singlehandedly destroyed the Longhorns by pumping in 17 points in a seven-minute span late in the first half. Bradley hit 14 of 15 from the foul line for the Tiggers, who meet Davidson tonight for the championship.

Villanova pounced on bigger Minnesota for a 77-73 victory and the Philadelphia Wildcats' first Holiday Festival tournament title. Villanova (No. 10) never had won a game in two previous appearances in the New York tourney, but the Wildcats zipped through three straight opponents to boost their record to 5-1.

Jones Wins MVP

Wally Jones, a 6-foot-2 backcourtman who played like a cat on a hot tin roof, scored 31 points and played a brilliant floor game to capture the festival MVP award. Utah finished third by beating St. Joseph's 83-76, while Providence won

Kentucky Replaces Loyola Atop Ratings; OSU Now 8th

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Kentucky Wildcats climbed back to a familiar position today—one they haven't occupied for nearly five years—the nation's No. 1 collegiate basketball team in the United Press International coaches' ratings.

Coach Adolph Rupp, whose Wildcats dominated the college basketball scene in the '40s and '50s, haven't been in the top spot since Feb. 9, 1959. Today, Kentucky edged unbeaten UCLA, winner of the Los Angeles Classic, by only six rating points to gain first place.

The Wildcats were ranked first by 49 of the 35 coaches on the UPI rating board, 12 rated UCLA No. 1, Loyola of Chicago (No. 3) received two ballots and Michigan (No. 4) and Davidson (No. 7) each were named on one.

Loyola had held the No. 1 ranking through the first five weeks of the season until it was upended by Little-regarded Georgetown of Washington, D.C., in the first round of the Quaker City Tournament Friday.

Once-beaten Cincinnati held fifth place; Vanderbilt, with nine consecutive wins remained sixth and undefeated Davidson moved up one position to seventh.

Kentucky ranked eighth; Duke, No. 9, and Villanova, No. 10, round out the top 10.

The ratings are based on games through Saturday, Dec. 28.

Wichita, winner of the All-College Tourney, advanced to 11th; unbeaten Stanford jumped from 19th to 12th and Minnesota, a finalist in the Holiday Festival at New York advanced to 13th.

Kansas State, Texas Western and St. Bonaventure followed in order 14-15-16. New York University and Utah tied for 17th and Oklahoma State and North Carolina, deadlocked for 18th.

Oregonian Poll Rates Medford 2nd; IV 4th, Phoenix 5th in A-2 List

Medford is rated second in this week's Oregonian A-1 basketball poll, and Phoenix is fifth in the A-2 ranks.

Medford, which did not play last weekend, had 90 points in the A-1 poll, only two less than South Eugene, which took first place. Medford has a 3-3 record, but two of the losses were to college freshman teams, the third to the top-rated Axemen. Klamath Falls is 10th in the A-1 poll.

Phoenix, with a 6-1 mark, is fifth, one notch behind Illinois Valley. The Cougars of IV defeated the Pirates in overtime Saturday night to win the holiday classic tournament at Cave Junction. Atop the A-2 poll is Coquille. St. Mary's received one vote.

Joe Named AFL Rookie Of Year

COATESVILLE, Pa. (UPI)—The big fellow, rubbing his eyes from a mid-day nap, blurted unbelievably and then blinked: "Wow! Thanks a million!"

That's how Billy Joe of the Denver Broncos, former Villanova fullback, received the news he was the United Press International rookie of the year in the American Football League.

Joe smiled happily when he heard that 16 of 24 AFL writers named him as the league's top rookie.

He was head and shoulders and his 245 pounds — over Dick Westmoreland, San Diego defensive back who was named on three ballots; linebacker Bobby Bell of Kansas City and defensive tackle Dave Costa of Oakland with two votes each, and offensive end Dave Graham of Boston who received one vote.

It was obviously a new experience for Billy — although he was voted the outstanding back of the 1962 Liberty Bowl — and he began to tick off the thank you's — "My coach who gave me the opportunity to move in and was patient with me. His patience, all of the players, everybody who tried to help me."

And when he finished, his great enthusiasm for football, a n d particularly professional football, began to take over.

"I really love it (professional) ball," Billy bubbled. "It's so very different from college ball. It's specialized, very complex. You have to know your job."

"As for me, I'm going to stay in professional football as long as they let me. Yessir."
