In the fall of last year the Hubbard school opened its doors on the thirteenth of September, the lucky date for Hubbard Hi. During the months that have past the school has taken upon itself to out-do everything that has gone before in the way of school activities, business, athletics, etc. For our success we ask you to glance back over the past year, over the records which the school has made and the efficiency it has attained.

We first began with foot ball; the late in the season our boys went after it with the spirit that wins and as a consequent result we finished with the high average of 667. The back field men were strong on line bucks and endruns while the line was one of the best that has yet represented our Alma Mater.

After foot ball the squad sallied forth to make a record in basket ball. Under the coaching of Wolfer we were brought around into shape by the first of the year and piled up

victory after victory with such regularity that the people began to think that it was a habit. We beat such teams as Independence, Milwaukie, and even held the fast Woodburn quintet to a 16 to 8 score. After about two months of playing we finished by trouncing Milwaukie 16 to 9 thus ending the season with a batting average of 577.

Not only did the boys play this game but look at the record the girls of the school made during the past year. Every team that they come up against were taken down the line by such enormous scores that it would be a crime to publish them. They played all the schools in the valley and finished with an average of 1000 which speaks for itself when it comes to a question of their ability to play.

Two literary societies were organized in the High school and many were the lively debates that poured forth from the youthful minds of the aspiring scholars. A great deal of good was accomplished from these debates in the way of training the people to stand before an audience and expound and expostulate on certain properties and propensities relating to a precarious condition of this promiscuous burg.

Outside of the regular course of study there was installed during the last half of the year a cooking and sewing club which has been heard of for far and near. Every one knows of the demonstration which was given at the hall some time in the past. Those who were there can testify to the success of the club by the experience they had eating some of the grub which was cooked by members of the club.

We regret that owing to the weather we have had very little chance to play much base ball, but leaving all of our mishaps aside we journeyed to Woodburn for our first game and played them a three hit affair for 9 long innings. As we are contemplating playing some more a complete report of our average at this time is impossible.

Taking everything together we feel like this has been a very prosperous year for Old Hubbard Hi. With the publishing of the Annual and other various activities we say without any hesitancy that we are proud of our

school and of what it has been doing during the past nine months.

Even now, as some of us are leaving the school we leave with the hope that next year will find a larger, bigger and better one than Hubbard has ever known.

As this is the last publication of the High school in the Hubbard Enterprise for this year we one and all wish to thank each and everyone of you for your support and help during the past year and hope that in some way your worthy efforts will be repaid in the near future and that the success of the school will continue from now on indefinitely as we are sure it will as long as the school and the community pull together and help one another—but when this fails something disastrous is sure to happen, for, "united we stand, divided we fall," and when we divide something is sure to fall.
