The National Grange will hold its annual session at Portland, commencing on the 16th of November. The fifth, sixth and seventh degrees will be conferred on the 19th at Marquam theater. All patrons should attend, as it will be a very interesting meeting, and it will be a long time before they come to Portland again.

The question of liquor license or no liquor will be on in this county in November. The amendment or prohibitory law lost in this county by a very small majority, and it will be no surprise if local option should carry in this county at the November election. The reason for this is the fact that the saloon men do not care for the law and make no effort to enforce the law. If they would run their saloons in a proper manner and would not permit gambling and drunkenness around their places, there would be less objection to giving them a license.

Columbia county contains 636 square miles, of which 552 square miles are covered with 27,700 feet, broad measure, to the acre. Agriculture is slow of development, as the big trees must be cleared away before farming begins. Along the waterways and the railroad dairies flourish. A large number of skinning stations and creameries have been established, notably in the upper end of the county, along the Columbia River and Willamette Slough. Dairy products find ready market at low cost, as there is access to Portland both by river and rail. Here the horticulturist finds soil and climate in which fruit and nut-bearing trees, except those peculiar to the tropics, grow to perfection. Mineral development has hardly begun. The Nehalem coal fields and iron mountains are inexhaustible, but the quality of the products remains to be settled. Railroads would make Columbia one of the most productive of Oregon counties. These apparently are not far off.

A Narrow Escape.

Tuesday a few minutes before three o'clock in the afternoon occurred an accident on Yeon's logging road that came near proving fatal to the train crew, and it seems almost a miracle that all should escape without any serious injury. The accident was not due to any neglect of any of the hands, but owing to the recent rains the road bed, through what is known as Jacob Bush's bottom, had softened more on one side than on the other, causing the track to settle. When John Sherrin's engine, which is known as "Two Spot," reached this point, it in some manner left the track and went bumping along on the ties, causing the rails to spread, and finally the engine left the track and turned over. The train, which consisted of engine and three pairs of trucks loaded with about 15,000 feet of logs, was running at a good speed, and it was also some down grade. When the engineer and train men saw that a wreck was inevitable, they watched their opportunity, and when the train had slowed up a little, jumped off. They had hardly jumped before the engine turned over. H.
