FIFTH JUDICIAL DAY.

License was granted to John Freeman to sell liquor in Scappoose precinct for six months, from Oct. 21, 1904.

Action on the petition of Ed. Hughes and others to change specifications of contract with Graham & Kent, for cut and fill at Clatskanie, was postponed until the court has time to investigate.

Three bids were submitted for publishing the delinquent tax list for the year 1903, and it appearing to the court that the bid of the Rainier Gazette, to wit, 3 1/2 cents per line, is the lowest bid, Ordered the same be accepted and that said successful bidder enter into a contract with the court to print said delinquent list for the time by law provided, at the price named in bid; also that they furnish a bond in the sum of \$100, with sufficient surety, to be approved by the court for the faithful performance of said contract, and the correct publication of said delinquent tax list.

The tax roll of 1903 now returned by the sheriff, showing the amount delinquent and uncollected thereon to be \$332.82, it was ordered that the sheriff be given credit on account of said roll for amount shown to be delinquent.
