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County Grange Convention.

The Columbia County Grange, P. O. H., met as per call in the village of Goble, Saturday, March 11, at 10:30 a. m., and was called to order by State Deputy J. W. Armstrong. I. H. Copeland was chosen chairman and R. H. Mitchell, secretary.

The chair appointed J. W. Armstrong, R. N. Lovelace and Mrs. S. J. Butler a committee on credentials. A short recess was declared, after which the committee on credentials reported the following granges represented and entitled to representation by the delegates and alternates named in their report, as follows:

Quincey Grange by R. A. Lillie and Mrs. E. Lillie.

Scappoose Grange by W. M. Farrell. Upon motion the report of committee was adopted.

The chairman then appointed Mrs. Winnie Bailey and W. A. Young as tellers.

The convention then proceeded to elect delegates, which resulted in the following being chosen:

I. H. and Anna Copeland of Houlton, delegates; R. H. and Emma J. Mitchell alternates.

J. W. Armstrong, delegate, and N. D. and Mary Peterson, of Mist, alternates.

C. W. and Jane Jones, of Clatskanie, delegates; Jas. Barr, alternate.

There were no special instructions to the delegates. The State Grange will convene at Forest Grove Tuesday, May 23, 1905.

After the adjournment of the county grange the members of Goble Grange entertained the delegates in a very hospitable manner. A banquet was served—one of the kind that only grangers can serve. It was enjoyed by all. After dinner the delegates and visitors were taken to the cold storage. This plant was quite a curiosity to most of those present. The George W. Elder, which lies on the rocks just opposite the Reuben postoffice, was also visited and there the divers were seen working at the great rents in the side of the vessel. The saw mills and other places of interest came in for their share of inspection. The delegates were then taken to the homes of the grangers and entertained until time for leaving. Many pleasant memories will be stored up as to the even of the day.

NEHALEM.

With the advent of spring finds the good people of the Nehalem Valley busily engaged in seeding and planting crops. The winter was not a severe one to the settlers as regards feed for stock, hence stock of all kind is looking well. What looked at one time to be a serious matter, the burning over of so much slash last summer and fall, had not seriously affected the stock raiser and dairyman, and pasture and feed will now soon be in abundance.

Our dairymen are all engaged in selling the product of their cows and wagons are on the go collecting the milk to be shipped daily to the creameries. Those of our farmers who have had keen foresight and embarked in raising mutton, are having agents for slaughter firms come right to their door and offer \$4 per head for sheep, and over 200 head have been sold at that figure.

Our people live in hopes and therefore are anxious to see what that new railroad building from Goble will do for us. But we depend upon our own efforts, therefore we are all doing what we can in keeping and making wagon roads upon which we must depend on getting our product to market. Mr. Editor, you will hear good reports from this section of Columbia county this fall, for we are all working hard and trying to produce something. This makes me want to say a word in favor of the Register, which we find is really a county paper—that gives the news and is up to date. We can not keep house without it and wish it the best of success.
