Good Roads.

The question of good roads in Columbia county has been and will be a leading one with the people of this county. For while all roads "do not lead to Rome," still they do lead to some town in which the farmer trades at a market and from which he ships his surplus products. The merchant as well is interested, for good roads over which travel comes the easiest and over which heavy loads are hauled is the secret of success in his trade—as regards sales.

While Columbia county is a timbered county roads are hard to make and expensive. On the prairies of Iowa the writer knows of numerous road supervisors who have as many as half a dozen sections in their control and all the trouble he is put to or expense incurred is on small bridges, all road work being done by poll tax. And there a road supervisor must understand his business. He is selected by vote of his neighbors. He takes a pride in the condition of roads in his district. Rock crushers there are as unknown as husking pegs are in Oregon.

The matter of good roads in Columbia county should be a question in which every farmer in his section is interested in and in which he should take a pride and assist in the work of securing. Good roads, like good citizenship, go hand in hand. Good, full days of hard work done by a few liberal spirited citizens in a locality, often performs wonders in the way of making travel possible over a dilapidated piece of road. But a piece of good road will never endure on a poor foundation, no more than a house will stand on a foundation of sand.

Good roads must have drainage and built wide enough to allow for travel. All public roads should be built with a view of endurance and each year added thereto. We are all interested alike in this matter and should pay our poll tax cheerfully. No one should really be exempt from paying poll tax, only age, be he fireman or letter carrier or president. A just pride in good roads, which benefits all alike, should be an incentive to have better roads.

While a great deal has been written and printed on this question, even to placing convict labor on them, let us adopt a little as outlined on this matter and see if we cannot help the county court in saving a dollar here and there as not to bankrupt us and still have nothing to show for what has been expended.

Oregon apples possess as fine flavor and are as good keepers as are grown in any state in the Union. The great fault with the apple industry is that orchardists experiment with too many varieties. In order to be successful the future apple raiser will have to grow but two or three varieties, good keepers, and ship in quantities direct to warrant the taking of his entire crop and not to dole out to unscrupulous commission houses who rob him of his labor and profits. Ship to Montana and other sections where fruit is scarce and appreciated and keep posted on the market.

It is a good sign when we see so much freight coming to Houlton. Somebody must surely live where so much is consumed. And where you see this you see a prosperous community and people.
