ORDINANCE NO. 3.

An Ordinance Fixing The Bonds of The Town Recorder, Town Treasurer, and Town Marshal, and Defining the Duties of The Town Officers.

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Houlton.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Town Recorder of the Town of Houlton to keep accurate minutes of the meetings of the Board of Trustees. Shall issue all town warrants upon the Town Treasurer ordered by the Common Council of the Board of Trustees, and shall keep a record of all warrants issued, to whom issued, and the amount of said warrants. He shall issue all licenses ordered by the ordinances of the Town of Houlton. He shall issue licenses where bonds are required only upon receipt of the money by the Town Treasurer, and upon the approval of the bonds by the Town Council. He shall collect license money tendered him for licenses authorized by ordinances of the town and shall give his official receipt and seal upon said license, showing the amount paid and the time for which it is issued. He shall issue all warrants of arrest and such other papers as are necessary to promote the peace, prosperity and welfare of the Town of Houlton. He shall perform all duties required of him by the ordinances of said Town of Houlton. He shall be under bonds in the sum of \$100, said bonds to be secured of some Fidelity

company, and paid for by the Town of Houlton. As compensation for his services, he shall receive 50 cents per night for attending council meetings and recording minutes of said meetings. For all other services he shall receive the same fees as a justice of the peace for like services.

Sec. 2. The Town Marshal shall execute all orders of the Town Recorder and perform such other duties as are required by the ordinances of the Town of Houlton. The Town Marshal shall give bond to be secured of some Fidelity company in the sum of \$500. He shall receive for his services the same fees as constable for like service, and such other amount as the Council may fix.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Town Treasurer to receive all money due the Town of Houlton, and receipt for same, pay out same only on the order of the President of the Town Council and attested by the Town Recorder. The bond of the Treasurer shall be \$200, secured in a Fidelity company.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Health Officer to look after the sanitation and health of the Town of Houlton and make such reports as are required by the laws of the State of Oregon.
