SCAPPOOSE NOTES.

Fine weather has made farming very interesting lately.

The Columbia Lumber Company commenced to dry the first kiln of lumber, this week.

Watts & Price are now painting the interior of their store, which they have been enlarging.

A large consignment of tiles came for the Heggie farm, which is one of the best in Columbia county.

Chas. E. Wickstrom, of the Columbia Lumber Company, has been to Kalama lately to tally lumber loading on a vessel at Kalama Lumber and Fuel Co's wharf.

Cooper Whitney and family have moved back to town from Washington and S. R. Sonneland has vacated their house, moving into one built by the Columbia Lumber Company for him.

LUMBER AND LOG NOTES.

Norman Merrill, of Clatskanie, is installing a logging camp at Marshland.

Henry Colvin, of Marshland, has installed another 10x12 Williams engine in his camp.

The Clatskanie Lumber Company, Clatskanie, is making a few changes in its boiler room.

Nordby & Johnson shingle mill at Clatskanie is turning out 65,000 shingles daily. Most of these are marketed in the Willamette Valley.

The Goble, Nehalem & Pacific Railroad Company, of Goble, are putting in the water about 75,000 feet daily.

McKinnon & Stennish, of Rainier, have let a contract to W. T. McIntire to put in about 3,000,000 feet of timber belonging to the firm.

The Rainier Mill & Lumber Company, Rainier, shipped out 24,000 feet of lumber to California in March, and its April shipments will reach about the same figure.

The West Oregon Lumber Company, Clatskanie, has completed its conveyor system. Manager Kingley will visit Idaho, Eastern Oregon and Utah, looking after orders shortly.

Wilson Bros' sawmill, near Clatskanie, is cutting cedar exclusively. Telephone poles are their principal output. Their mill has a daily capacity of 10,000 feet and their chingle mill 20,000 per day.

Willard Case, of St. Louis, president of the Willard Case Lumber Company, of that city, and also of the Wilson-Case Lumber Company, of Rainier, expects to visit this section of the Coast next month.

Columbia Lumber Company, of Scappoose, is operating its mill at Scappoose and using the name of the Scappoose Lumber Company, which is not operating its mill at present. The Columbia Lumber Company is installing a planer and dry kiln.

After a shut-down for 30 days, the Tichenor Lumber Company, of Clatskanie, again began operations on April 1. The company has built a tram road for transporting its logs to mill, and is installing a road engine for hauling away from the yarder. The company expects to cut about 4,000,000 feet during the present year.

The Summit Lumber Company, Clatskanie, is cutting 15,000 feet per day. It has installed a new cut-off saw. The company is working on an order for two cars of cedar telephone poles to be shipped to Stockton, Cal., and is also cutting an order of rough lumber and car rails for the Graham Lumber Company, Astoria, destined for Kansas.

The Nordby Lumber Company, of Portland, is building a saw and shingle mill at Rainier, Ore., with a capacity of 50,000 per day. It will be equipped with double circulars, gang edgers, live rolls, three upright shingle machines, etc. Two dry kilns, 25x50 each, and a planer shed 30x50, will be erected. Manager Nordby expects to have his new mill in operation by June 1.

The Goble & Nehalem R. R. Co., of Portland have placed an order through M. P. Brady, Oregon representative of W. D. Hofus & Co., Seattle, for a 35-ton Shay locomotive to be used on the road. The company is extending their road and has purchased one mile of 30 ton rails. The Curtis Mill Co., of Mill City, Ore., expect to receive the 65-ton Shay shortly.

Geo. Rocky, of Rainier, is building a logging railroad one and one-half miles long from his timber to the main line of the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad at Rainier. Later on the line may be extended. The road will be standard gauge and laid with 30-pound rails. Mr. Rocky's present equipment will consist of a Shay loco,otive and four cars. He expects to have the line in operation by May 1.

The Wilson-Case Lumber Company, Rainier shipped to Milwaukee, Wis., during the month four cars of 6x12 dressed timbers 22 feet long, clear. It would have been difficult to find handsoner stock any where. The company also shipped a 40,000 foot cargo to San Fran, Cal. When its present timber shall have been all logged off, which will take several years, it is probable that the mill will be dismantled and the machinery installed in a new mill on the side of the mountain directly opposite the present location.

The Benson Logging & Lumber Company, of Portland, opened its camp at Bunker Hill, Wash., February 26. During the six succeeding weeks the cut reached a total of 9,000,000 feet. The average cut by day at the Bunker Hill camp is about 200,000 feet. The equipment was increased recently by the addition of two new Washington Iron Works donkey engines. The company will not operate its Sunset Camp near Clatskanie this year and probably not next year. The increase in freight traffic on its logging railroad has compelled it to increase the warehouse facilities at Clatskanie. The new building will be 40x30, and the company expects to have it completed by May 15.

The Columbia River Door Company, Rainier, has finished off a handsome new office in one corner of its warehouse, which it will occupy the latter part of April. Its March shipments comprised fourteen cars, distributed through Oregon and Washington. The company is putting in a hydraulic elevator in the warehouse to facilitate the handling of stock. The Boy branch of the American Wood Working Company, at Williamsport, Pa., is building a special saw mortiser invented by Manager Fine, which cuts from one to six mortises in a door style at a single operation, and which mortises 2,000 doors per day. The first machine will be installed at the Rainier plant and then the machines will be put upon th market.
