PEN, PASTE AND SCISSORS.

If the statement contained in last week's *Mist* relative to the saloon business is true, there is certainly need for a grand jury in this county.

There still lingers with us the old notion that government is a something to punish people with, some great power to restrain, and never think of it as a means for securing their bread and butter and providing for all human needs.

A recent law enacted by the Legislature will go into effect next Tuesday. It provides that all railroad companies doing business in this state must, whenever tickets are sold, provide a regular authorized agent and must have an established place of business. Any one selling railroad tickets in violation of this law is liable to fine and imprisonment. A depot, telegraph and ticket office is one of the great needs of Houlton.

\$5000 FOR A POODLE DOG'S OUTFIT.

Cleveland Moffett in his series, "The Shameful Mistake of Wealth," now running in *Success Magazine*, is making some startling exposures of the manner in which our idle rich waste their money. He quite caps the climax, however, with the following informa-

tion regarding the wilful waste on the pet dogs of the women:

"There are pet dogs in New York," I insisted, 'worth \$5000. There are St. Bernards worth \$7000. There are women in New York who spend \$1000 a year on clothes for their poodles."

"On clothes for their poodles?"

"Certainly; on house coats, walking coats, dust-coats, sweaters, coats lined with ermine at \$200 each, automobile coats with hoods and goggles, and each coat fitted with a pocket for the poodle's handkerchief of fine linen or lace."

"I never heard of such a thing."

"It is absolutely true. Furthermore, those women buy for their pet dogs boots of different colored leather to match the coats, house boots, street boots, etc., that lace up nearly to the knee and cost from \$5 to \$8 a pair. They buy half a dozen pairs at a time. And they buy collars, set with rubies, pearls or diamonds, at several hundred dollars each. A man who makes a specialty of such collars told me of a woman who imported from Paris a complete outfit for her poodle costing \$2000. And one lady had a house built for her dog, the exact model of a Queen Anne cottage, with rooms papered and carpeted and the windows hung with lace curtains. Every morning a woman calls (a sort of dog governess) to bathe and comb and curl and perfume the little darling, and then take him out for his walk. He eats and drinks from silver dishes and if he gets a stomach ache, a specialist is promptly summoned."

"What a dog specialist?"

Precisely. New York has its fashionable dog doctors, who get \$10 a visit and sleep with a telephone at their bedside for night calls, like regular practitioners. One lady whom I know summoned a specialist from New York to Newport and kept him there for a week, at a \$100 a day, because her poodle was ailing."

COLUMBIA POMONA.

Fourth Quarterly Session.

BEAVER VALLEY, May 6, 1905.

The Columbia County Pomona Grange met in the Twelfth Quarterly session in Beaver Valley Grange No. 306 hall, at 2 p. m.

The roll of officers was then called and the following pro tem appointments made:

Pearl Monroe, ceres.

N. D. Peterson, asst. steward.

M. C. Jordan, lady asst. steward.

Grange opened in due form in the 4th degree, with W. A. Young, W. M., in the chair.

Minutes of last grange meeting held at Deer Island read and approved.

The Worthy Master made a recommendation that each of the officers make written reports to be filed with the secretary.

Report of granges was then taken up.

Scappoose Grange in better condition than at any other time; hold two sessions per month; has a membership of 40, and four applications for next meeting.

Veil, Vernonia and Yankton granges were not represented and no reports had been sent the secretary.

Milton Grange of Houlton was reported holding its own with 24 members in good standing. Considerable interest manifested.

Deer Island Grange had 28 in good standing with an average attendance of 25. There is room for lecture work at this point.

Goble Grange has 46 in good standing, with an average of about 17. The prospects for future of grange reported good.

No report from Rainier or Mayger and it is deemed advisable to take up the charters of these two granges.

Natal Grange, which is located on the Nehalem, about midway between Mist and Pittsburg, is doing nicely, with 49 in good standing; 3 applications, and an average attendance of 28.

Clatskanie Grange is again at the front with the banner report; has 60 members in good standing, with an average attendance of about 15.

Cedar Grove Grange has 46 in good standing with an average attendance of about 12.

Quincy Grange reported alive, awake, and doing very nicely; has

31 in good standing; 2 applications for membership.

Beaver Valley Grange have almost completed paying for their hall; have 44 in good standing and the average attendance fair.

The Worthy Master then appointed A. D. Holaday, of Scappoose, N. D. Peterson, of Natal, and F. Woodham, of Goble, as a committee on resolutions.

A short recess was taken for the payment of dues and to allow the committees time to prepare reports.

Immediately after recess the committee on resolutions reported:

We, your committee, endorse these resolutions and recommend their adoption.

WHEREAS, There was a bill introduced in the last Legislature for the election of road supervisors by the people, and it failed to pass the Legislature; and

WHEREAS, The Legislature of Oregon has failed to comply with the wishes of the people; therefore be it

Resolved, That there be petitions prepared and circulated in and out of the Grange in the different parts of Oregon in order to bring about the election of road supervisor by the people, said initiative to be taken in June election of 1906.

Adopted, and secretary instructed to prepare copies of same to the delegates from this county at the State Grange.

Resolved, That the county court should require each and every road supervisor to file an itemized bill for labor performed on the road by him, or by his team or teams and men and teams hired by him, giving date and place where the labor was performed. Also that he itemize all other bills presented by him to the county court.

This resolution was unanimously adopted and the secretary instructed to bring this matter before the county court.

E. H. Flagg, president of the Columbia County Lewis and Clark Club, spoke for a half hour, giving in detail the question of an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Fair.

A general discussion of the question, "Does Fruit Raising in Oregon Pay," was discussed by A. D. Holaday, Fred Woodham, W. H. Kyser and others. The question was settled in favor of the affirmative.

The question of chicken raising was presented in a very interesting manner by Brother Oleen, of Deer Island, who claims that the chicken industry pays a good dividend on the investment.
