The N. R. A. Encampment

Vol. 4 No. 7 of The Salute is on our table and is a very interesting review of the work of Newell River Academy.

"During the Easter vacation, the cadets of the N. R. A. went upon the military encampment to old Camp Gibbon, near St. Helens, O. The Oregon National Guard camped upon these grounds several years ago, and thus this place derived its name of Camp Gibbon. The fact that the National Guard had camped there was one of the main reasons why this place was chosen for our encampment. This encampment was the first of its kind ever held by any school or other military organization, out-side of the National Guard, since the early days of the Boys' Brigade of this city. Consequently it was commented upon quite extensively in the papers, and from all sides good wishes for its success were expressed. The cadet officers of the school worked very hard to carry it through with the willing aid of the privates when their aid was needed, and they were amply rewarded by the complete success of the trip.

I will now make a few remarks about our encampment in the form of a diary, which was taken and inserted here in its original form. The keeper of this diary is to be congratulated upon its correctness:

"Wednesday, April 19.—Left Portland on steamboat America at 2:30 p. m. Good many people upon the dock to see us leave. Gave school yell while boat pulled out. Amused ourselves upon the boat by playing games, sleeping and eating. Reached St. Helens at 7 p. m. Immediately started out to our camping place. Had trouble finding it. Arrived there about 8:30 p. m. Cooking supper was first thing. I was detailed on kitchen police. I know nothing about cooking, so all they made me do was to loll the water, and then they said I scoured that. After supper, i. e., after eating-time, for I hate to cast any reflection upon the word "supper," by calling that meal supper—pitching of tents followed. All up at 10:30. Went to bed then. Couldn't sleep much at first. At last I entered the peaceful gates of dreamland and the day was finished for me.

"Thursday, April 20.—Reveille at 5 a. m. Breakfast at 6 a. m. Tents had to be taken down again and placed in line so as to form a company street. Whole day was devoted to arrangement of camp, and the drawing up of plans for the work to be accomplished while in camp. Guard mount held at 4:30 p. m. I should have gone on guard today, but had stand-in with the First Sergt. and got out of it. The guards have two hours on and four off their post. It is hard graft, I think, as the nights are very cold and the days warm. Menu today consisted chiefly of hardtack. In the evening I got a pass to go to Houlton, a little town near our camp. Got back at 9:30 p. m. Went to bed then.

Saturday, April 22.—Heard early in the morning that our camp was to be attacked by a body of soldiers from the Oregon National Guard. Nothing doing in drill except the placing of gill-nets. Lieut. Toose was in charge of the outposts, and Capt. Fink of the main body. The enemy failed to show up. Outposts were kept out until we received direct word from Portland that they had not left that city. All the outposts were then called in and after a few words of advice from Sergt. Major Stewart we were turned loose to go to Houlton to attend a dance there. Got back to camp at 12 M., and went to bed immediately.

Sunday, April 23.—No drill today. Most of the day was devoted to showing visitors through camp. Had a good dinner. A good many young ladies called in the afternoon. Went to bed early.

Tuesday, April 25.—Some of the fellows had remained up all night. About 3:30 a. m. they pulled down all the tents and woke us all up. I got up soon afterward. Breakfast at 5:30. Chicken forms the main element of the meal. What about the America at 6:30. Arrived in Portland at 11 o'clock and the encampment was over.

"Our encampment was now a thing of the past. It is with a due sense of regret that we have to say this, but a good thing cannot last always. The cadets who went upon this trip are unanimous in the opinion that it was the best time ever had in as short a space of time. For this good time, we first have Mr. Newell, our principal, to thank, and then we have Sergt. Major Stewart, of the United States 14th Cavalry, who was in charge of us, and last, but not least, the people of Houlton and St. Helens to thank for the generous hospitality they extended to us while we were encamped in their midst.
