number of communities. Bills for this purpose have been \$20. Realizing the importance of united and well directed action in order to accomplish satisfactory results in legislative lines, we deemed it expedient to call together a number of those who have in the past been most closely identified with the legislative work of the order for the purpose of determining upon a course of action for the Grange. As a result of this conference it was decided that the Grange should undertake to initiate two bills to be submitted to a vote of the people in 1906.

The principal event of the afternoon session was the reading of his annual address by State Master B. G. Loedy. In it he recounted the past achievements of the order and its condition to the present time. It was referred to the committee on division of labor.

Reports were received from other officers during the afternoon session following is State Treasurer Hirschberg's report for the month ending May 22, 1905, which was referred to the finance committee. Cash on hand, May 22, 1904, \$4293 25; Received from Secretary, \$439 22; Total, \$8642 47; Disbursed, \$3277 77.

Cash on hand May 22, 1905, \$5384 70. The Grange adopted a resolution fixing meeting hours as follows. Morning sessions, 9:30, afternoon sessions, 1:30; evening sessions, 8 o'clock.

A pleasing incident of the session today was the presentation of many floral emblems to Mrs. Clara H. Waldo, state lecturer, the occasion being the commemoration of her 47th birthday anniversary. The presentations were made by ladies of the State Grange, and were accepted by Mrs. Waldo in a fitting response.

A public reception and entertainment was arranged for the evening at the College Chapel, presided over by H. J. Buxton, master of the Forest Grove Grange. There were appropriate musical selections, and addresses of welcome by State Senator E. W. Humes and W. N. Ferrin, president of the Pacific University. Responses were made by Mrs. Waldo and Dr. James Withycombe, representing the State Grange. The attendance was very large, the people of Forest Grove being very cordial and enthusiastic in their reception to all visitors, of which there are several hundred already on hand and many more coming.

The second day's session of the Oregon State Grange was more largely attended than yesterday, several hundred visitors arriving on the morning and evening trains.

The business of the day was begun as soon as the Grange was open, the first order being a roll call of counties for resolutions, which were referred without debate.

President Ferrin, of the Pacific University, extended an invitation to the visitors to visit the buildings and grounds. The invitation was accepted and at 1 o'clock the membership went in a body to the college, where two hours were spent in a very enjoyable manner. Short addresses were made, interspersed with music, and the work of the college was given a most thorough inspection. The speakers were Hon. Napoleon Davis, a member of the board of trustees Mrs. Tozier Weathered, Judge R. P. Boise and W. D. Hove.

The secretary's annual report shows a financial condition in accordance with that exhibited in the treasurer's report. The condition of the order is the best in its history in Oregon, a slight gain in membership having been shown since last year. There are now 92 Granges in the state, with a membership of 5493.

The report of C. L. Shaw, state treasurer, contained a good suggestion in regard to public schools, which will be taken up by the Grange. He would have the school laws regulated so as to provide for a uniformity of terms, giving each nine months. It was pointed out that the county districts frequently pay more taxes in proportion than the city districts, and that there is not a just distribution of the funds provided for educational purposes.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. The report of the executive committee was adopted as follows. Immediately after the close of the last session of the State Grange a meeting of the committee was held and it was decided to continue the same general plan of extension work with the same course of action that had been allowed heretofore.

Four new Granges have been organized during the year and bills have been allowed as per statement made further on in these reports. Although no action was taken by the State Grange at the last session in regard to maintaining headquarters at the state fair, on account of the approaching session of the National Grange, and the necessity of establishing some central bureau of information so that our members might become familiar with the arrangements for the meeting, your committee felt that it would be expedient to maintain our headquarters. A tent was therefore secured for this purpose, and Brother A. F. Miller was employed to take charge of it. The total expense of this tent amounted to \$41.40.

At a meeting held in October final arrangements were made for the meeting of the National Grange. We are pleased to report that the funds raised by the committee who solicited the funds in Portland proved sufficient to meet all the expenses which were incurred, so that it was not necessary to draw upon the State Grange treasury for this purpose.

At the same meeting it was decided to carry out the instructions of the State Grange in regard to inspection work of the order. It was decided to offer \$1.25 per day and necessary traveling expenses as compensation for deputies doing special inspection and instruction work, and individuals were selected, whom it was thought would be especially suited for work in various parts of the state.

Your committee felt that the compensation offered was ample, but with one exception none of the individuals were so situated as to be able to accept the work upon the terms offered. Sister Mary S. Howard undertook the work in Clackamas county and did regular inspection work in seven of the granges of that county, where it was thought to be most needed. We are well pleased with results, so far as the work has gone, but we regret that we have been unable to carry it further, as we realize as truly as any one the absolute necessity of work of this character if all the fields now occupied are to be retained. In fact, it will be noted from the worthy secretary's report that ground has been lost during the past year.

Early in January, Brother J. Vorhees resigned as a member of the legislative committee and Brother Thomas Paulson was appointed in his place. Shortly after this a special contract was entered into with Brother Vorhees to go into Eastern Oregon and canvass in a number of fields where there was thought to be good prospects of organization, as well as to build up and strengthen some existing granges which were evidently much in need of help. As a result of his work one new grange Ramsey Park, No. 352, has been organized in Dufur, Wasco county. Much preliminary work has been done in a number of other sections and an important section of Eastern Oregon has been saved from absolute loss to the Grange, and, we trust, permanently restored to the field. We have approved bills for expenses and per diem in accordance with this contract amounting to \$138.88, and, considering the results accomplished and the opening made for future work, we consider the money well spent.

Realizing the value of good literature in creating sentiment favorable to the Grange, and thus opening the way for organization, we have taken advantage of the very liberal offer of the American Grange Bulletin, of ten 3-months' trial subscriptions for \$1, and have sent it to do missionary work in a
