The Capitalist's Press.

Because the Portland "Oregonian" professed some sympathy toward "practical Socialism" the "Oregon Mist" of St. Helen Ore., has a severe fit of pessimism at the outlook for the country and the editor parades that chestnut about Socialism aiming to reduce men to a common level. We admit it would be tough on a lot of human beings to be dragged down to the intellectual level of the "Mist" editor, but we have intentions otherwise.

His idea is that the intellectually superior rule the rest now and that those who don't rule are in the proper stations for which their mental calibre fits them. But such is not the case. The fellows who rule now, do so because of their wealth in material things, not in brains. The fellows with the brains have not awakened to the incongruity of their digging away to create wealth for men whose gray matter is absorbed in either getting more profits or getting rid of them.

Given a system of ownership by society the whole people, of the machinery of wealth production, the opportunity for a few capitalists to monopolize ownership in that machinery would be obviated and equality of opportunity among all men would be possible. Then brains would, for the first time, have a chance to win upon its own merits.

Even the "Mist" editor would then have a chance to save himself from his present unfortunate mental condition. So he can nourish hope and calm himself.

SHOULD LOOK NEAR HOME.

Here is something near home that should interest the "Mist" editor. The Travelers' Aid Association of Portland is an organization composed of women, who are interested in taking care of young girls coming to Portland to secure work and in preventing others from coming at all.

The association has sent out a vigorous note of warning to girls and young women wanting work to keep away from Portland. It appears that thousands of young women are being attracted to Exposition, only to find no opportunity for work, and those employed are compelled to accept low wages. The Portland "Telegram" says the landlord and boarding house keepers have raised rents so that working girls after they pay the advanced price of living, they will have left from a weeks wages but a fraction of a dollar for clothing and incidental expenses.

And the girls who come, deceived by false reports are usually stranded and in plain words, compelled, in the majority of cases, to become prostitutes to save themselves from starvation. This is what we can read between the lines of the Associations warning.

and ambition vainly seeking the opportunity to work, and going down to ruin and degradation because they cannot get it.

And yet the "Mist" editor (like hundreds of his kind) calls Socialism an "iridescent dream", because it seeks to abolish such conditions!—"The Toledo, Ohio Socialist".

Borther Flagg copied the above article last week and this is his comment:

"The Oregon Mist, though published in a small community, and presumably of little influence, appears to have attracted the attention and ire of the Socialist, published at Toledo, Ohio, as we are in receipt of a copy of that paper, with a rather personal article reflecting upon the quality of the matter in our cranium. We had not supposed that this was the topic under discussion. But it seems to us that the editor of the Socialist must be mistaken in at least one of his conclusions, and we would like to have the opinion of some of our local socialists say: "We do not understand why, under the socialist theory, brains should be given a chance to win upon its own merits. NO man is entitled to peculiar credit for the possession of brains. They are very largely a matter of inheritance. Many parents are apt to produce brainy children, and why should any individual be allowed special privilege merely on account of the possession of this unearned mental increment? There is no special merit in it, and, as the owner did not create it clearly it should be subject to public ownership. Man's natural rights should be superior to mere intellectual capabilities or attainments. The tool should by edict be made the equal of the philosopher, and all the different gradations of intellect should be raised or lowered to a common level. This would be true equality. This would be the perfection of socialism, and is the only thing necessary to give full force and effect to this glorious theory of absolute equality in all the walks of life. The Socialist further says that thousands of young women are being attracted to the Portland Exposition by false reports (presumably as to the opportunity to secure employment.)

"There is no wilder language to be used in regard to this statement than to say 'It is a lie,' and if any citizen of Oregon sent such a statement to the Socialist he should be heartily ashamed of himself. The Association to which the Socialist refers was organized for the purpose of preventing any such state of affairs, and no false reports have been sent out, and neither thousands nor hundreds, nor dozens of young girls or young men have been deceived into coming to Portland in the vain hope of securing work, nor is there any scarcity of work in the city of Portland or the State of Oregon. The women who prefer prostitution to domestic service and men who think the world owes them a living and would rather steal than do hard work will doubtless find their level, but this has always been so and will continue until socialism equalizes brains and ignorance and puts idleness and industry, vice and virtue, on the same level.
