

ORDINANCE No. 5.

An Ordinance Defining The Limits For Shooting Fireworks.

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Houlton, Oregon.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful to shoot or fire any sky rockets, Roman candles, booms, firecrackers or other fireworks along or near the County road in the Town of Houlton from a point opposite the Mathews hotel property to the Milton Creek bridge.

Section 2. Any person convicted of violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction may be fined in any sum not to exceed twenty five-dollars.

Section 3. There being an emergency this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 6.

An Ordinance to provide for the taxing and killing of Dogs.

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Houlton, Oregon.

Section 1. The owner or person having in charge any dog within the town limits of the Town of Houlton shall on or before the first day of August of each year pay into the Town Treasury the sum of One dollar in gold or silver coin for each and every dog owned by him or them, or in their charge, which shall entitle him to a receipt from the Town Recorder or Town Marshal designating the owner's name and the number of the license granted.

Section 2 Any person, an inhabitant of the Town of Houlton, permitting any dog of which he is the owner, or of which he has control, to go abroad in any of the streets, squares, lanes, alleys, or public places of the town, without having first paid the license required by this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, before the Town Recorder, be subjected to a fine of not less than five, nor more than twenty-five dollars, or by imprisonment in the town jail not to exceed ten days.

Section 3. The Town Recorder shall keep a suitable record of the license granted, and on the expiration of the annual time for issuing licenses, shall give the Town Marshal a list of the owners and numbers on which license has been renewed.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Town

Marshal or such other person as shall be duly appointed therefor by the town council, to seize kill and properly bury in some suitable place, any and all dogs found running at large in the Town limits when owner or person having in charge thereof has failed to pay or renew the license, provided, that when a dog has been taken up by the Town Marshal on which a license has not been paid, and the owner of such dog is known, the Town Marshal shall notify the owner or representative thereof, who may thereupon recover possession upon payment of the license fee of \$1 and a fee of \$1 for each and every dog so claimed, provided further that no dog shall be killed unless it has been kept at least 48 hours except as provided in Section 5.

Section 5. No shut or female dog in time of heat no habitually vicious dog shall be permitted to run at large whether licensed or unlicensed and the owner or persons having charge of same permitting any such dog to run at large shall upon conviction thereof before the Town Recorder be liable to a fine not less than five or more than twenty-five dollars.

Section 6. The Town Marshal shall receive the sum of \$1 for each dog seized, killed, and buried as provided in Section 4 of this ordinance to be paid by the Town, but shall be recoverable in addition to fine and costs in any case of conviction for violation of this Ordinance.

Section 7. No person or persons shall hinder or molest any person or persons who may be engaged in seizing any dog, killing or removing the carcass in conformity with this ordinance under penalty not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars, or imprisonment not to exceed ten days for each offense.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the Town Marshal to prosecute for all violations of this ordinance.

Section 9. The Annual time for issuing licenses shall be on the first day of August of each year no license shall be issued for a less period than one year provided any person applying for license between the first of February and the first of August shall pay therefor a sum equal to one half of the yearly license.

Section 10. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars and costs of suit or be imprisoned in the Town jail not to exceed ten days.

Section 11. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its approval by the president of the council.
