COMMUNICATED.

A gentleman from Rainier sends us the following asking that it be printed calling the Town, County, Judicial District officers attention to the matter.

Rainier has the distinction of having a Town Marshal, who runs a saloon. This saloon is run on Sunday the same as any other day, regardless of the fact that the owner as a Town officer has taken an oath to obey and enforce the law. The recent grand jury admonished the various local officers to pay more attention to enforcement of the law, but here such an admonition is only laughed at. The violation of the Sunday law by the saloons has been so constant that their owners have come to regard it as their right to run on Sunday, although they are supposed to give a bond not to do so. This disregard of the law is characteristic of saloon keepers everywhere. Their mis-called places of business are only schools for crime and lawbreaking, and the owners have little regard for the laws of God or man. But when a Town officer, under oath to obey and enforce the law, finds it necessary to go into such a dirty and disreputable occupation, he should at least have decency enough to resign his office; or the Town Council if they have any standing should take away his salary and unceremoniously kick him out of office. But alas! Our Town Council!

The Log Cabin Saloon was the scene of a very pretty scrap about four o'clock on Monday afternoon between Langston of the place. The result was that one of our citizens, who seemed to want the reputation of a bully, met the man he was looking for, and equaled "enough" in good shape. By the way, this saloon is the one that is owned by our Town Marshal. We have not heard of any arrests. We have no doubt this saloon will sustain its reputation, in the future as in the past.
