It used to be the duty of the Town Marshall to care for these things when the salary of the office was only \$2.00 per month, but since the salary has been raised to \$5.00, it seems there are less duties to perform. This seems to be the rule, the higher pay, the less work.

Frank McCuskey's new cottage in Moek's Addition is nearly completed. It makes a very pretty appearance. Parker Stenwick and family will occupy it. Our excellent public school, which his children will attend, as his interests in the soap factory, and logging camps, have induced Mr. Stenwick to move his family from Portland to Rainier for the coming year.

The Rainier Creamery Company has a new churn of much larger capacity than the old one. It has a capacity of about 500 gallons and will enable the operator to make as much butter at one churning, as with the old churn could be made in two. This creamery now turns out as much as any in the county, and of equally not excelled by any in the state.

During the month of May, 105 loaded cars were shipped from this place, during June, 93 cars, and if the rate keeps up for the rest of July as it has begun, the number of cars shipped from here for this month will exceed both May and June.
