PETITION FOR LICENSE.

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Columbia.

In the matter of the application of Louis Fluhrer for a license to sell liquors in quantities less than one gallon in Oak Point precinct.

To the Honorable County Court of the State of Oregon, in and for Columbia County:

Greeting:

We the undersigned legal voters of Oak Point precinct in Columbia County, State of Oregon, who are actual residents of said precinct and who have actually resided therein for thirty days prior to the signing and filing of this petition, would respectfully petition your Honorable body that at the regular term of the County Court, commencing on Wednesday the 6th day of September, A. D. 1905 to be held in the County Courthouse, in the City of St. Helens, in said County and State, a license be granted to Louis Fluhrer, to sell spirituous, vinous and malt liquors and fermented cider in quantities less than one gallon, in Oak Point precinct, Columbia County, Oregon, and that such license be issued to said Louis Fluhrer for a period of 12 months from the 6th day of September, A. D. 1905, and your petitioners will ever pray.

JUDGE McBRIDE SPEAKS.

As Mount Hood cannot be symbolized by exhibiting a lump of ice from her mighty glaciers, nor the Columbia river by icing on view a bucket of water, so the fields and meadows of Columbia county, its mighty forests, its grand waterfalls, its fisheries, its manufacturing establishments can only be poorly depicted by any exhibit, however costly. Her exhibit is life—the life of the growing forest, the life of the waving grain and green meadow; the life of the flashing stream and rolling river; the life of the factory—that to be appreciated must be seen.

"But with all our newness and undeveloped resources we have accomplished some things down in Columbia and we have many things which nature has accomplished for us to which, in the language of the political platform we can point with pride.

"Although a large county territorially, it can be truly said that there are not 10 acres of waste land in the whole county. From the fertile bottoms of the Columbia across the fire-covered hills to the Nehalem and down the Nehalem to the North line of the country every acre can be cultivated and will repay cultivation when the timber is taken off. Unlike the pine lands east of the Rocky mountains, our fir land is rich and productive, and is not worthless when the timber is removed.

I wish some of the people here had seen a humble, unpretentious apple tree that grows in our yard near Deer Island. Neglected as a lawyer's trees usually are, that last year produced 15 boxes of merchantable apples, besides small and imperfect ones that were rejected.

"I would like to have people from the east go down and see the Columbia river bottoms enriched each year like the valley of the Nile by the annual June overflow of the river, and emerging green and beautiful from its bosom like a new Atlantis from the sea. I would like to have them see these same meadows flecked with countless herds of dairy cattle, the germ and potentiality of the milk, cream, and butter that gratify and satisfy the appetite of Portland.

"I would like to talk about the valley of the Nehalem, destined to be the center of a vast agricultural and lumbering community, producing richly everything from grass to hops, with a railroad just about to creep in and open it up to market.

"Then there is our iron and our coal—undeveloped beds of both reaching almost across the county from east to west and practically unexplored but promising to be a source of future wealth. I candidly believe that in the course of a few years Columbia County will be the location of great and profitable coal and iron industries.

"And there is our timber. I can speak of that with the proof at hand. You have all visited the beautiful Forestry building and admired its massive columns. Well those are Columbia county trees, and there are billions of feet just like them, or better still uncut in our forests.

"The commission had to get these logs without much selection and where timber was handy to transportation and early put in water, so as to preserve the bark intact and beautiful. They could not go away back into the interior of the forest and select the best and largest and have not done so, although they have done well.

"The government forestry reports estimate the standing timber of the county at nearly 10,000,000,000 feet. Do you realize what that means? Cut into fencing it would make a good mile high law fence three times around the earth. Give Columbia county the earth and she will build a fence around it. Ten billion feet means that we have enough lumber standing in Columbia county to roof in Rhode Island and Delaware. Enough to roof and wall in Rhode Island with a wall a mile high. Enough to build a bridge wide enough for wagons to pass each other from here to the Philippine Islands. No city on earth has as much lumber in its buildings as we have standing in Columbia county.

"Get the forestry reports and figure a little for yourselves and you Columbia county people look up through the openings in timber to the blue heavens above it and thank God for the heritage He hath given you.

hewing of our timber we can talk about salmon—the Royal Chinook. Hundreds of men are spreading their nets in Columbia county waters to harvest the crop that is sown on our own rivers, matures in the ocean, and conveniently returns to be gathered in when it is ready for market. Our sloughs, lakes and larger streams are now stocked with the black bass, shad salmon trout and the humble but toothsome catfish.

And are we doing anything with these resources? Yes, verily, we are. A dozen mills, small and great, are cutting our timber into lumber and supplying a local demand as well as sending great quantities away to every port on the Pacific.

"The shingle weaver is abroad in the land and Columbia county stands away up on the list as a producer of shingles; sash and door factories are making music on the Columbia county air; a stove factory is doing an export business; a toilet soap factory is turning out enough soap each week to wash away the sins of all the politicians in the United States, and as that is saying a good deal; a cold storage plant is shipping fish to all parts of the world. Flumes in various parts of the country, representing an investment of several hundred thousand dollars, carry cheaply and expeditiously the product of our forests to the great Columbia; logging railroads are piercing the recesses of our hills and we have orchards that yield in more than abundance; dairies that are making their owners rich; our citizens build and own steam boats. We have plenty of local newspapers, cleanly and decently conducted and well patronized. The people are loyal to their home newspapers, and in addition our post offices will show that there is no other county where more outside papers and magazines are taken in proportion to population. We read in Columbia county and try to know a few things, and think we do.

"Our educational standard is high. We have plenty of good schools and a settler in even the most remote part of the county will find that he has facilities for educating his children. We have plenty of churches and few saloons; no poorhouse nor any need for one. We have our little jail about fifteen feet square and generally empty, perhaps about one criminal trial a year in the circuit court.

"Our county is out of debt. Don't forget that. A man can take his order and go straight to the treasury and get the goods and gold for it without the interposition of a broker.
