PETITION FOR LICENSE.

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Columbia.

In the matter of the application of Louis Flehrer for a license to sell liquors in quantities less than one gallon in Oak Point precinct.

To the Honorable County Court of the State of Oregon, in and for Columbia County:

Greeting:

We the undersigned legal voters of Oak Point precinct in Columbia County, State of Oregon, who are actual residents of said precinct and who have actually resided therein for thirty days prior to the signing and filing of this petition, would respectfully petition your Honorable body that at the regular term of the County Court, commencing on Wednesday the 6th day of September, A. D. 1905 to be held in the County Courthouse, in the City of St. Helens, in said County and State, a license be granted to Louis Flehrer, to sell spirituous, vinous and malt liquors and fermented cider in quantities less than one gallon, in Oak Point precinct, Columbia County, Oregon, and that such license be issued to said Louis Flehrer, for a period of 12 months from the 6th day of September, A. D. 1905, and your petitioners will ever pray.

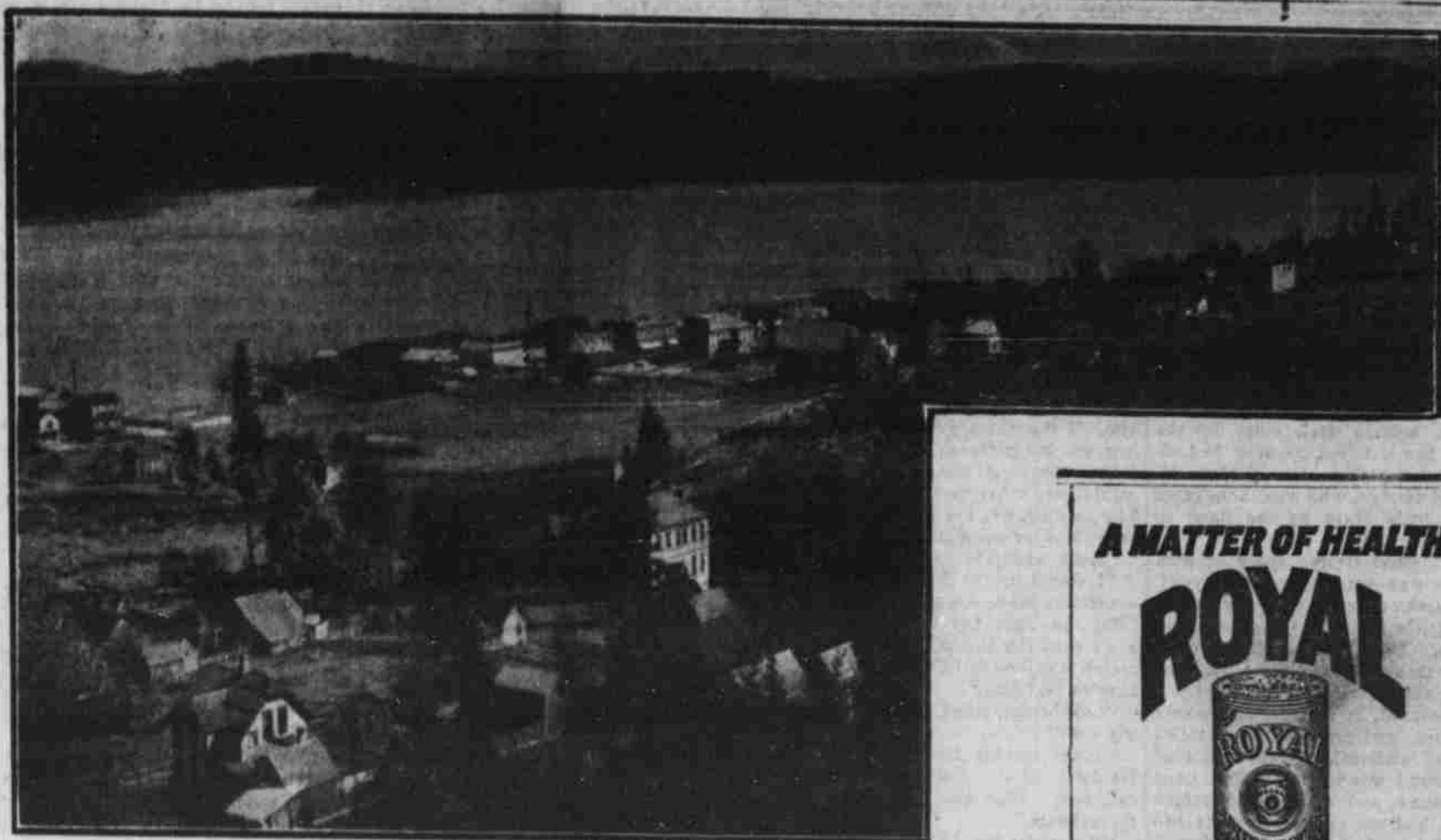

Agree to Obey Laws.

A Colfax Special says: "R. T. Street the young bookkeeper who started a crusade against saloons and narrowly escaped being murdered by unknown thugs who waylaid him at night, has given up the fight and gone to Portland. Mr. Street's parents live in Portland, and when they learned of the attempt on their son's life they insisted on his returning home. It is thought now that the incident is closed and that no further prosecutions of the saloons will be made.

The city council held a special meeting last night to consider the charges made by Street against the saloons, and his demand that the license be revoked. Street was not present, but Rev. George H. Newman, a local minister, pressed the charges and took Mr. Street's place as prosecuting witness. In face of the fact that the saloon men had paid fines of \$50 and costs, each, it was agreed by the council that their license would not be revoked, but that hereafter, if they violated any section of the ordinance controlling saloons, their licenses would be taken from them and money they had paid on licenses would be forfeited. Rev. Newman expressed satisfaction with this arrangement.

Mr. Jas. Sheldon the fish monger of St. Helen was in Houlton a few minutes the day after the fishing season was closed. He said that the run of fish at St. Helens had been better this season than in any former season since he commenced buying fish there. Some of the fishermen who were fishing with what is called a "wheel barrow" a single boat had caught as high as seven tons during the season just closed, at 5 cents per pound this would net them \$700; which is pretty good for three months work. The fish season will open Sept. 10th the price will not be as good as for Spring catch but it is expected that the run of fish will be enough heavier to make up for the deficiency in the price.

Mrs. James Dart of St. Helens, occupying the handsome new cottage next to Dr. Cluff's in West Seaside, fell from the back porch Thursday and sustained very serious injuries. The lady was carrying a large pan in front of her and as she stepped on to the porch she slipped and plunged headlong to the ground striking on her head.
