One of the great needs of Houlton and St. Helens is better schools. We do not desire to cast any reflection on the management of the schools of either place, but one thing is patent to the casual observer. It is impossible for the teachers of either district to take up the 8th and 9th grade work and do justice to the pupils of the other grades. The state law should be amended so that the eighth grades shall only be taught in schools having three or more teachers. The ninth grade only in schools where four or more teachers are employed. We have good teachers in Houlton as there are in the county, but it is impossible for them to teach five grades in one room and three in the other. The thing that should be done, and that right soon, is to consolidate the two districts, and build a school house on the hill just this side of Mr. Crawford's residence or near the ball grounds, between Houlton and St. Helens. The school house with the expenditure of a few hundred dollars could be made into a court house that would answer Columbia county for the next twenty years. The Houlton school house could be sold for a residence and the money derived from the sale of the two buildings would almost if not quite build a new four room house this could be added to as it would no doubt require more room in four or five years. Houlton is up against the proposition of erecting another room and employing another teacher or else the eighth and ninth grade pupils will have to go elsewhere for their schooling.
