RAINIER DEPARTMENT.

One of the largest real estate deals made in this vicinity for a long time was consummated last Saturday when Geo. Meek sold to Messrs. Rutherford and Heacock 1000 feet of his splendid water front, from Fox Creek west including the Farmers Dock and the roadway leading back, and extending from the railroad to the river. The tract contains about eight acres. The purchase price was \$4,500. The purchasers intend erecting a saw mill, the main saw to be a band saw. Orders for machinery have been placed, and work begins at once. These parties have rented houses and will bring their families here to live. There is no better site on the Columbia River for milling purposes than the one these men have bought. A mill of this kind projected is worth more to this town than the County Seat. Both buyer and seller have made a good bargain and the Town is the biggest gainer of all. This is the only mill property in town that spans a street. Now lets get busy and open Water street from end to end of town, and more industries will go in.

At an adjourned meeting last week, the Town Council granted a water franchise to the parties asking it, and practically in the manner they desired. A petition bearing the signatures of nine-tenths of the property owners and taxpayers of Rainier was presented, requesting that certain provisions be inserted for the protection of the interests of the people. This petition received scant attention from the Council, and was virtually ignored. The result is that the Town is bound for twenty five years while the owners of the franchise are not. No bond was demanded and for that reason nothing can be enforced. It is safe to guess that the same wretched water will continue. It is a bad thing for a Town when a petition of its taxpaying citizens has no weight with the officers who are conducting its affairs.

Miss Cornelia Marvin, secretary of the Oregon Library Commission, spent Saturday in town organizing a free public library under the state law. A meeting of the Town Library Board was held in the office of W. C. Fischer at which Glad Stewart was elected president and Miss Lois Henry, secretary. A further meeting will be held Wednesday evening Sept. 13th, at which time committee will be appointed to ways and means devised, a location chosen, and a librarian elected. A constitution by laws and rules for the government of the Board and Library will be adopted. Miss Marvin offered valuable advice from her large experience in such matters.

The County Court granted the petition of Felix Debast and others for a county road. The petition was one of the strongest that could have been presented but the county surveyor ignored the petition, one of the most important parts of the road and located a new grade and thereby will cause delay in opening road the grade will be heavier and the cost greater. The whole job of road locating is one that reflects no credit on the work of the surveyor, and will certainly be remembered unfavorably by the petitioners.

Mrs. A. Elliot returned home on Saturday after a ten days stay in Portland with her sister, Mrs. Sweeney, who was hurt in a street car accident. She reports Mrs. Sweeney much improved though not able to walk yet.

C. Kensey has begun work on the graveling extension from below the Powell bridge to the old Cook place and assisted by Geo. Armstrong who has done some good work. He will start laying on gravel this week. When finished it will give us a mile of the best road in the county. It is with thankful hearts that we learn of the completion of the new Clatskanie frame, thus enabling Nehalemites to market their goods without costing almost their value in horse flesh to get to market and their groceries back home. It would be interesting to know how many hundred tons of freight has been hauled up that horrible 27 per cent grade in the 25 years of its life.
