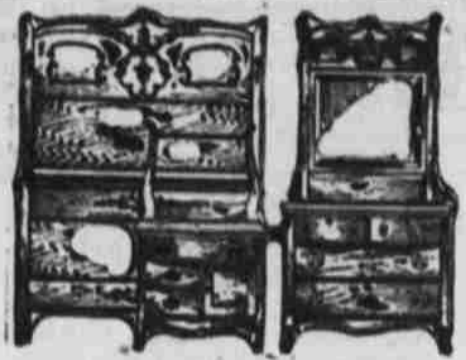

The fair ends tomorrow. It was a success.

The county court will be in session tomorrow.

Brother Flagg seems desirous of squaring himself with the Clatskanie convention, of 1904, when and where he legged so earnestly for Williamson.

No one regrets the verdict in the Williamson case, except certain members of the Mitchell faction, whose abnormal taste for public pap can never be satiated.

J. J. Underwood, Nome commissioner at the Lewis and Clark Exposition has just received from Alaska a specimen of tin ore weighing 450 pounds. The specimen contains 60 per cent tin, and is worth twenty cents a pound.

The total admission to the Lewis and Clark Exposition up to Sept. 27 was 2,066,545. It is expected that the grand total will be not less than 2,500,000 a better record than was ever before made by an enterprise of similar magnitude.

The Lewis and Clark Exposition closes at half past eleven o'clock Saturday night, October 14. It was originally intended that Oct. 15 should be the closing day, but as this date fell on a Sunday, the change was made. The Fair has been a tremendous success.

The livestock show at the Lewis & Clark Exposition, which closed September 29, was the crowning feature of the Fair. It was much better attended than was the livestock show at St. Louis and in some ways superior. The showing of shortborns was the best ever made in America.

The Mist seems considerably agitated over the conviction of the latest batch of land fraudists, especially the congressmen (excuse the travesty) Williamson, and devotes a half column of its valuable space to a doleful exhibition of its editors feelings thereat. The Mist admits that Williamson "turned the trick" but seems to intimate that punishment should be suspended because "they are by no means among the thief beneficiaries of the frauds perpetrated upon the public domain." The Mist further states that "it is a matter of general knowledge that the crime for which Mr. Williamson was convicted was not considered by the people of Oregon, to unfit a man for the association of his fellow men." Such an expression is worthy the effort of the most lurid journalist in the country, even the editor of the Police Gazette would turn green with envy should it meet his eye. We desire to know if by "fellow men" the editor has in mind the Mitchell faction of the republican party, or the members in fair standing, or common decency? We are unable to conceive of a mind so obtuse, a mental ability so atrophied, a conscious so enfeebled, as to desire the association of a convicted perjurer or one guilty of subornation of perjury. It is not alone the fraudulent and illegal acquisition of the land for which he stands convicted, that indeed is slight in comparison with having induced his unsophisticated neighbors to perjure themselves; it is unimportant when estimated with the crime of having been false to his official oath, to his country and his State; it is as nothing to infinity when a man in his position so lowers the moral tone of the country, and no punishment can be too severe. Secretary Hitchcock is the custodian of the public domain, and is responsible, for its proper management, to the people; if his strenuous attempts to preserve it from despoliation by thieves, big and little, are to be met by leniency

and forgiveness, he may as well resign and his office be abolished!

Begin to make preparations for the Oregon State fair to be held at Salem next year.

Brother Flagg must have a fellow feeling for Williamson and Mitchell, at least it would appear so from the way he rushes to their defense.

The evening of the last day of the Lewis & Clark Exposition has been designated as Goode Night, in honor of H. W. Goode, president of the Exposition.

Secretary Hitchcock having exceeded his authority, by saying that those guilty of subornation of perjury should receive the full penalty, it is now up to the Mist editor to have him removed. Will Roosevelt do it?

There is a talk of a new road from Seappoose to the Nehalem valley. A wagon road should have been built out that way years ago and it would now be a great convenience to the people of the valley who are compelled to go to Clatskanie to do their trading. Let the road be opened as soon as possible.

Governor Chamberlain has entered into a contract with Lowenberg-Going Company for the leasing of convict labor, 150 men for two years at 34¢ per hour per man. The governor thus conforms to the spirit of the resolution passed at the last legislature which anticipates that prison labor can be successfully employed upon public roads. The governor again concedes his willingness to abide by the will of the people.
