Lytle Will Build Railroad to Nehalem.

The Hillsboro Board of Trade is pushing the matter of a right of way between Banks and Buxton for the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company, the new company formed by E. E. Lytle, for the purpose of building a railroad into the Tillamook country, the eastern terminus being this city. Mr. Heidel, who has the work in hand, reports that the rights between the two above-named points will be ready to turn over to the company within a week.

The rights are already secured between this city and Banks, a distance of ten miles, and part of the line is ready for the rails. Extensions of the time are now being signed, to correspond with the requests of the new company, which is taking up the right of way of the Portland & Nehalem.
