ELECTION POINTERS.

A general election will be held on June 4th, 1906, to elect the following officers: Governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, attorney general, state printer, representative in U. S. congress, representative in state legislature, sheriff, clerk, treasurer, judge, surveyor and one commissioner.

A primary election will take place on April 20th, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the offices to be filled at the ensuing general election.

2. Selecting candidates for a United States senator.

3. Selecting delegates to conventions to be held.

4. Election committees for each election precinct. Each committee-man thus elected is to be the representative of his political party in and for such precinct, these committees will constitute the county central committee of each of said political parties.

The direct primary nominating election laws disprove that all political parties shall hold their primaries at the same time and place and it also designates that this work shall be fairly, freely and honestly conducted. It is necessary for the preservation of the public welfare and safety that there should be a free and fair vote by secret ballot and honest count at primary elections and general elections. Members of every political party and voluntary political organization are rightfully entitled to know that every person who offers to take part in the affairs of such party or organization in these states in good faith a member of that party. This is provided for in section 15, which reads as follows:

"No person who is not a qualified elector and a registered member of a party making its nominations under the provisions of this law shall be qualified to join in signing any petition for nomination or to vote at said primary nomination election, and no person shall be qualified to sign any nominating petition of any other party than that with which he is registered as a member, but this shall not be construed to prevent any registered member of any party from signing a petition for the nomination of any independent or non-partisan candidate, nor shall it be construed to prevent any qualified elector from signing petitions for more than one candidate for the same office on one party ticket."

While all electors are at liberty to vote as they please at the general election it will be seen that the party lines are closely drawn. In making the nominations. To take any part in the later the voter must be registered with some political organization.

The registration books were opened on January 2, and closed for the primary election on April 10. They opened from April 25, and close for the general election on May 15 at 5 p. m. There is a day for filing petitions for nomination.
