Trusts and "Business Interests" HOW THEY WORK TO DOMINATE POLITICAL AFFAIRS

If the primary law and Statement One thereof shall finally become established in Oregon, no one need imagine that it will put the special privilege class out of business. It will prove effective for that purpose only to the extent that the people may prove their intelligence and ability to use it.
