A VOTE WILL BE TAKEN

On equal suffrage constitutional amendment.

On amendment to the local option law giving anti-prohibitionists and prohibitionists equal privileges.

On law to abolish tolls on the Mount Hood and Barlow Road, and providing for its ownership by the state.

On Constitutional amendment providing method of amending constitution and applying the referendum to all laws affecting constitutional conventions and amendments.

On constitutional amendment giving cities and towns exclusive power to enact and amend their charter.

On constitutional amendment to allow the State printing, binding, and printer's compensation to be regulated by law at any time.

On constitutional amendment for the initiative and referendum on local, special and municipal laws and parts of laws.

On a bill for a law prohibiting free passes and discrimination by railroad companies and other public corporations.

On an act requiring sleeping car companies, refrigerator car companies, and oil companies to pay an annual license upon gross earnings.

On an act requiring express companies, telegraph companies, and telephone companies to pay an annual license upon gross earnings.

THE LAW ENFORCED.

Two prominent railroad officials have been sentenced to pay a heavy fine for violation of the interstate commerce law, and the Burlington road, in whose interest they were working, must also dig up \$60,000 as bail for the outraged feelings of the Government. Last week Benjamin D. Green and John F. Gaylor were sentenced to pay a fine of \$575,749.90 and serve four years in prison for irregularities in connection with Government funds. Meanwhile the Government is spending vast sums in the apprehension of some of the minor offenders against the land laws which were broken in Oregon. All of which is evidence that, while our Uncle Sam has been somewhat low in his movements, he is at last beginning to insist on a proper observance of the majesty of the law.—Oregonian.

Farmers Institute.

A farmers institute of one day's session will be held at Clatskanie Friday May 4th, under the auspices of the State Agricultural College and Columbia Pomona Grange.

There will be present Dr. James Withycombe, Prof. Cordley, and Prof. F. L. Kent, of Corvallis, Hon. E. L. Smith of Hood River, Mrs. Clara H. Waldo, State Grange Lecturer of Macleay and many other good speakers.

Columbia Pomona Grange will hold its regular quarterly meeting at the same place the next day, Saturday May 5.

As this is the last meeting of the Pomona Grange before the State Grange convenes at Albany May 22, much important business will come up, not only in relation to the state meeting but in completing arrangements for holding a county fair this fall.—
