LAW ENFORCED.

Should laws be enforced? It would seem that there could be no difference of opinion among good citizens on this subject, but that there is admits of no question. Indeed the sentiment against the enforcement of certain laws essential of good morals and civic decency has been so strong in the past that public officials entrusted with the duty of enforcing these laws and protecting the people against degrading and corrupting influences have with impunity neglected and refused to enforce them. This is particularly true of the sheriff's office in Umatilla county. The law against gambling and Sunday closing have been flagrantly and persistently violated and no real effort made to bring the offenders to justice. Sheriff Taylor has tacitly admitted his failure to enforce the laws in the past by his promise, under strong pressure, to enforce them in the future. There has always been more or less doubt as to the efficacy of a death bed repentance and the action of Sheriff Taylor in promising to enforce the laws on the eve of election, after having for four years failed to do so is open to suspicion.
