The granting of patents by the government to the forfeited railroad lands is going to add largely to the taxable property of the county, and particularly to that portion of it near Hood River. Much of this land near here has been located for a number of years, and much more of it will be located just as soon as the department will allow. It is safe to assert, that the taxable property of this portion of the county will be (with the exception of the railroad) doubled by this time next year.

The insurance companies have settled with the county for the damage to the court house by the recent fire, paying \$2750. This amount will repair all damages, and under the efficient management of Mr. C. J. Crandall the architect in charge of the work of repairing, it will probably leave a handsome balance.

Rev. Delos Howells, who has been doing missionary work in Eastern Oregon for some time past, returned home Tuesday and will remain here until after the holidays. He informs us that a church at Coudon has been established and the building is about completed, and that eight persons joined at one meeting.
