Little Money Feeds Many.

Mary Winkfield in her report to the London School Dinner association says: "The head teachers and the local committee are responsible for the selection of proper cases and for the suitable provision of the meals given. The association has hitherto been able to make a grant in reply to each suitable application, and during the last season they aided in the provision of over 263,000 meals. There are now more than 650,-000 children upon the rolls of London elementary schools. The small proportion of 2 per cent. of necessitous cases would give a total of 1,300 children. To give these children three dinners weekly would cost over £150 per week."-London Letter.
