HOOD RIVER, ORE., JUNE 11, 1892.

Judge Bennett is probably defeated for the office of supreme judge by a thousand votes in the state. He made a remarkably good run, cutting down the republican majority at least 5,000 votes. His phenomenal vote in this county, his home, shows the confidence even his political enemies had in him. He got his full party vote and almost one-half of the republican vote. His defeat is in some respects a victory, and we feel sure that Judge Bennett thoroughly appreciates the splendid tribute paid him.

There is abundant time between now and the November election to organize a company and bring the waters of Hood river through the valley; or, if desired, to stand in with some of the companies already organized for the purpose. When we all wake up to the necessity of having water, and the equal necessity of each one doing his individual share towards the good work, something will be done, and until that time—well, it won't.

According to the returns so far received the people's party polled about 7,000 votes this year. This leaves the republicans with about 1300 majority in the state on the supreme bench vote, and on the congressional vote of about 7,000. With no ticket in the field for the office of president this fall, it will be the deciding vote, and Oregon will be democratic or republican, just as this vote shall see fit to make it.

The county seat fight in Sherman county was settled Monday in favor of Wasco. We feel sorry for Wasco, where we have many friends, for she made a gallant fight, but such is the way of the world. To Wasco was due the credit of getting Sherman county cut off from this county, and it looks as though the county seat should have been given her.

The election is over, and, as usual, is not entirely satisfactory to any one. Hood River, however, has discovered that the Dalles knifed every candidate in here, regardless of politics. We have no kick coming because of this, but take our medicine cheerfully, as it will do us no harm. It is not likely that it does have a nasty taste.

Hood River, Baldwin, Cascade Locks and Mosier cast 500 votes, or about as many as Sherman county. The fact is very suggestive. By the November election, with a full vote polled, this number should be increased to over 600.

The Dalles papers, in giving the vote on congressmen, have all put Ellis' vote in this precinct at 127 and Slater's at 27. The latter should be 127, as the candidates tied in this, Baldwin and Mosier precincts.

We stated when Bradshaw was nominated that he would carry the district by 1,000 majority. This has proven to be a remarkably close guess, as the 1,000 was just 1 too much.

The news of Bradshaw's election reached here Thursday afternoon, and was about as welcome a piece of news as ever gladdened our heart.

Pum Kelley is invincible, as he met both parties in the political arena and was elected sheriff of Multnomah county over both.

Hermann's majority will be about 2,500, and Ellis about 2000, taking the returns in as a basis on estimates of those to come in.

Judge Bennett's vote in this county was one worthy of him and which should have been duplicated in every county in the state.

HARRISON RE-NOMINATED. The Republican National Convention met at Minneapolis, Tuesday, and the first ballot was taken Friday afternoon, resulting in the re-nomination of Harrison by the following vote, 453 being necessary to a choice: Harrison 335; McKinley 182; Blaine 182; Reed 4. Harrison's nomination was made unanimous, and the convention adjourned at 8 p. m.

The Jews on the Malabar Coast. The house of the British resident at the Court of Cochim stands on the island of Balghatty, in the midst of the lagoon and it is easy to visit from both the native and the British town. The most curious thing in the former is the very ancient Jewish settlement, which goes back far beyond all authentic record, and is in possession of a deed engraved on metal which may well be as old as the Seventh century A. D., much older, that is, than any existing manuscript of the Old Testament. How the Jews came there is a mystery, but it is perfectly possible—may, even probable—that there were commercial dealings between the ports at the head of the Red sea and the Malabar coast at an immensely remote period.

The pepper trade, which has its main center between Calicut and Tellicherry, rather to the north, must be one of the oldest in the world.—M. E. Grant Duff in Contemporary Review.

Traveling in China. In north China you may perhaps have your choice of three methods of traveling.
