HOOD RIVER, OR., JUNE 25, 1892.  
CLEVELAND NOMINATED.

The democratic national convention at Chicago nominated Grover Cleveland for president on the first ballot at 3:30 o'clock Thursday morning. Much time was consumed in the nominating speeches, and just before the ballot was taken a terrific rain storm set in, the big tent looked like a shower bath and the delegates and audience were thoroughly drenched. Even this could not dampen the ardor of the delegates, and a motion to adjourn was voted down by almost a unanimous vote. On roll call Cleveland received 6123 votes, Hill 113, Biles 105, Gorman 361, Stevenson, 105, Carlisle 13. Cleveland's nomination has seemed inevitable, and yet the opposition had almost strength enough to have defeated him. He had barely the two-thirds necessary to a choice, and had this strength not developed, it is more than probable his name would not have graced the head of the ticket.

The *Moro Observer*, noting the fact that we expressed sympathy with Wasco in her defeat on the county-seat question, says that we will probably need a little sympathy ourselves, "hence our tears." We have always heard that a generous foe would not kick an opponent when he was down, and the *Observer's* sneer at us because we expressed sympathy with Wasco in her defeat shows that the editor of that paper is not only ungenerous but also unjust.

The Portland city election, Monday, was an overwhelming defeat of the republican straight ticket, but largely due to the independent republicans. The old ring was badly smashed and the material for a new one created. We believe that Joe Simon fixed the slate for Cohen and Wygant, and that he is as potent a factor in Portland politics to-day as ever.

Emmons Blaine, second son of the secretary, died very suddenly at Chicago last Saturday. The cause of his death was blood poisoning, resulting from inflammation of the bowels. Young Blaine had taken an active part in his father's candidacy and took his defeat very much to heart.

Congressman Ellis is reported to be in a critical condition. It seems that from some cause his leg had to be reset, and it has been asserted that blood poisoning has set in. This is but a rumor, and we sincerely hope a false one and that the genial smile of our new congressman may soon again be visible to his friends.

E. M. Shutt has moved to Antelope, and will issue the first number of the *Antelope Herald* about July 1st. We understand the paper is principally started for the purpose of agitating the creation of a new county from portions of Wasco and Crook counties.

As every point on the railroad is to celebrate the 4th, they will all be in the same condition, that is, each will have a gathering of its own people only, except Hood River, to which many will come.

General A. A. Stevens, of Illinois, is nominated for vice president on the Democratic ticket.

**The Suit Decided.**  
The suit of Bernard Warren and others against the Oregon Lumber Company, was decided by Judge Bradshaw, Wednesday, in favor of the plaintiffs. By the terms of the decision the Oregon Lumber Company are restrained from diverting the waters of Phelps creek from the natural channel at any point below the dam at the head of said creek by means of said flume or feeders or in any manner whatever. And it was further ordered and adjudged that plaintiff have and recover from defendant his costs in the action and that execution issue therefor.

**How We Grow.**  
Mr. E. L. Smith has put up a substantial fence around the forty acres on Indian creek he bought of Samuel Clark.

A great improvement has been made on the Rankin place since Mr. Jones bought it. An addition to the house, new fencing and new ground cleared, change the looks of the place so one would hardly recognize it.

The Hershey brothers have put up a very neat picket fence along their whole line.

Next comes the Odd Fellows' cemetery, which a few months ago was all woods, but now is nicely fenced, cleared and lots staked off. When the wicket gateway and other improvements are completed it will be an ornament to the street.

J. T. Neileigh, beside putting up a house, has cleared and fenced part of his land and got in some wheat.

The Rand place, under the care of Mr. Orser, is looking in better condition than it has for several years.

Mr. Heald's orchards are kept in a state of model cultivation.

The Husbards place, which was bought last fall by Mr. Bateman, has had considerable new fencing and clearing done and some nursery stock started. He expects to build a house in the spring.

Mr. H. F. Davidson, who bought forty acres of Mrs. Monroe, has built himself a neat house and has his place under good cultivation.

A great number of ugly stumps and brush, which ornamented (?) this part of the road last year, have recently been buried out, much to the appearance of the street.

J. H. McCoy's place always strikes us as a model little home.

Both A. L. Disbrow and Peter Hinrichs have considerable more land under cultivation than they had last year.

The next noticeable improvement is the new picket fence in front of the Congregational church. It is both neat and substantial and an ornament to the place.

All the farmers along here are doing well in the way of clearing, and each year sees new ground broken and less stumps in the old fields.

The McKay place, since its purchase by Mr. Sipina, is undergoing such improvements that if they continue as he plans they shall, one would not recognize it as the same place. A new house and barn are both to be built this summer.

These are some of the improvements which would be noticed from the road by a person taking the drive for the first time since last summer. We have not tried to enumerate all the improvements, and we have not mentioned the fine house built by Mr. Elliot, or the building and clearing going on along the line of the proposed new road which is to run from Hershey's, around by Baker's and out through Disbrow's.

To see these one would have to do more than go round the block, which was the road we noted these improvements on.

The road is in fine condition and the drive is becoming more beautiful and popular every year.
