## PRIORITY OF RIGHTS.

The company represented by Mr. McCoy has filed upon 60,000 inches of water from the east fork of Hood river and a like amount from the west fork. As the whole river at low water carries not to exceed 50,000 inches, there is likely to be a severe dry spell in the river. We called attention frequently to the danger our people ran in neglecting to file on and appropriate water for irrigating purposes, and fortunately some 5,000 inches were appropriated prior to Mr. McCoy's filing. McCoy's filings are properly made and might prove a source of annoyance, at least, to all of us, were it not for these prior appropriations. As it is, Mr. McCoy will hardly care to invest his money in a ditch where the people are opposed to his scheme, and where no market would be found for the contents of his ditch. In this light, and from these conditions, it is safe to go ahead with any ditch project, and Mr. McCoy's rights in the premises will, perhaps, cut no figure, as to maintain them he must commence work.

That Abraham Lincoln was a hard-worked man in his early days is evidenced from the following items, gathered from a free, truthful and untrammeled press in the course of the past six years. Before Lincoln reached the age of 25 years he whipped 463 bullies, won 284 wrestling matches, took up the quarrel or defence of 296 sickly boys, all of whom are now hale and hearty old men; escorted 64 flat boats to New Orleans; and all this besides working a year or more each for more than 200 farmers. The papers say so, and we cannot help but wonder at the martyred president's constitution standing up under the demands so freely made—by the papers—upon it.

Our young friend Lawrence Blowers writes the *Oregonian* on the political aspect of the country and expresses his opinion freely. Lawrence has no faith in either of the old parties and cannot indorse the financial position of the people's party. There are hundreds of voters in about the same position, dissatisfied with present affiliations, and doing the Noah's dove act. A party with low tariffs and sound money ideas, indorsing the doctrines of electing U. S. senators, stopping immigration, and issuing pensions only to old soldiers' actual need, would coral voters enough to break all the other parties.

Train robbers derailed a passenger train on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad, near Osage City, Wednesday. A switch was put in on a curve and the train ran over an embankment eight feet high. The engineer, fireman, expressman and a guard were killed. The object of the robbery was to obtain \$1,000,000 which was being sent from the City of Mexico to Boston. The robbers fled without attempting to get the money.

All the big transcontinental railroads have pulled out from their traffic agreement, and rate cutting has commenced. It is quite probable if peace is not made soon that the round-trip ticket from Pacific coast points to Chicago will be sold as low as \$25. At any rate, the price will be low enough that even a printer can afford to go. It would just be our luck, however, to be unable to catch the low rates without running against the cholera.

The dispatches Thursday show but little change in the cholera condition. A few cases are reported as suspects, and one or two deaths in New York city have been pronounced Asiatic cholera. The quarantine is rigidly maintained, and it looks now as though the fight was to be won by Dr. Jenkins and his able assistants. Jenkins may be a Tammany appointment, but he has proven to be the right man for the occasion.

A ship having cholera on board arriving at a Canadian port was met by the city authorities with a fire engine, ready to drown any German who attempted to land. The water battery served its purpose and none of the immigrants undertook to charge it.

Another cruiser, the Cincinnati, will be launched from the Brooklyn navy yard to-day. Her engines are of 10,000 horse power, and she will be able to steam 22 miles an hour. Slowly but surely the United States is getting a navy that will compare favorably with those of other great nations.

The city of Hamburg is at last getting free of her terrible scourge, the cases and deaths decreasing steadily each day. Those of her citizens who fled to the seaside are returning and business is again opening up.

Cleveland and Harrison are before the public, using every available means to gain the public favor, while Corbett already stands on the proudest pinnacle of fame, notwithstanding the fact that he "beat" his way up.

Professor Bernard of the Lick observatory has discovered the fifth satellite to Jupiter. It is a little fellow, but the discovery is the engrossing subject among astronomers.

Mrs. Harrison was taken in a special train from Loon lake to Washington City Tuesday. She stood the trip well and is slightly better than a week ago.

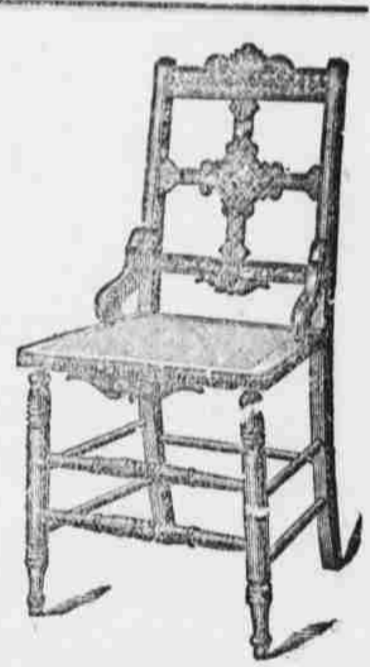
