HOOD RIVER, OR., OCT. 15, 1892.  
COME TODAY.

For the past week the gentle rain has fallen and already vegetation is starting. The rain was needed, and yet we fear will prove more of an injury than benefit. This will certainly be the case if it causes any to lose interest in the irrigation question, and this we fear it will do.
