At a meeting of the directors of the Hood River Water Company last Saturday, assessment No. 1 was levied on the capital stock, the amount being 8 per cent. This assessment will become delinquent Dec. 28th.  
The steamer Regulator arrives here on her return trip about 3 o'clock in the afternoon, since the slide at Redfish was conquered. Before that she was as uncertain as an election, and partly for the same reason, that is the big loads she carried.

The contract for the completion of the Cascade locks has been awarded to Messrs. Day, of San Francisco. Bonds in the sum of \$400,000 have been filed, and when these are approved by the department the plant and work will be turned over to the contractors.  
The case of the state against Birgefold, which has occupied the attention of the district court for the past week, was submitted to the jury Tuesday evening. The first ballot of the jury stood ten for acquittal two for conviction, and on the second ballot he was acquitted.
