To Be Prosecuted.
Under the new game law it is made the duty of the game and fish commissioner to prosecute all violators of the law. One of the first acts of the new commissioner was to give notice that he would enforce the laws for the protection of salmon and other fish, and that those allowing sawdust to be deposited where the high water would carry it into the Columbia, or any stream of the state, would receive attention first. The matter has been neglected heretofore, but those interested will save themselves a heavy fine by at once taking care of their sawdust.
