THE LAW AND THE CHINESE.

The Geary law has been declared constitutional by the supreme court of the United States, and nothing now remains but to enforce it. Until congress meets, there is no money available to carry out the provisions of the law regarding deportation, but there is enough to commence operations on, by arresting a few Chinese, and testing the question as to whether those who have not registered as required by the act, can come into court and with a proper showing, be allowed to register now. We believe the latter view of the law will be taken, and although we have been at all times strongly opposed to Chinese immigration in any form, we think that the proper solution of the fight was against the Chinese coming here, not so much against those already here. This interpretation of the law would be just to the Chinese here, because it makes their deportation voluntary and does not interfere with rights acquired lawfully, and which the Geary law does not seem to take into consideration. It is true the law provides a certain day, May 5th, beyond which they can not register; it is equally true the Chinese had fair warning and, interpreting the law for themselves, failed to take advantage of the opportunities offered them to remain. They can have no just cause of complaint if deported at once, since their own disregard of the law has placed them in this position. The object of the Geary law, was not to deport those already here; but compel them to provide themselves each with a means of identification, so that the unlawful coming of others could be prevented. From the Chinese stand point, nothing is due them; but from our own, we believe as we said at first, the proper solution of the difficulty is to carry out the obvious intent of the law.

FLOODS EVERYWHERE.

Reports of heavy floods through the eastern states continue to be the subject of the despatches. It is reported that near Cleveland Ohio, the railroad tracks are ten feet under water. In Pennsylvania a steady downpour of 60 hours duration ended Wednesday, but leaving every creek a river, and the rivers floods. The reports from neighboring states are of similar character. On the Pacific coast the rain fall has been phenomenal. The Spokane river, although its source is a lake nearly 60 miles long by 12 broad in high water, is rising at the rate of an inch an hour. This is an indication of what may be expected from other tributaries of the Columbia, and presages the highest water ever known.

WORSE THAN SILVER.

The men employed by the contractors at the Cascade Locks are not delighted with the manner in which they are not paid. They are given a receipt at the end of the month which shows that they have worked so many days, and states further that at the end of 30 days a check will be given them, payable 30 days later in San Francisco. These receipts are practically worthless, as the storekeepers in the Cascades refuse to honor them. The railroad up Hermann creek built by these contractors was so crooked an engine would not run over it, but yet it does not seem to be the most devious thing in that section.

The world's fair directory has voted to open the grounds on Sunday hereafter, and to return to the U. S. treasury the money appropriated with the condition that the fair should be closed on Sunday. The directors have done a very sensible thing, for they have provided for the harmless entertainment of at least 200,000 people every Sunday, who otherwise would find such amusements as the saloons and cheap theaters give. It is the judgment of sensible christians as against cranky ones.

The National banks through Michigan, Illinois, and Indiana have taken a tumble, some fifty going under, immediately following the wreck of the Chemical bank of Chicago. With \$1,000,000 in gold going out of the country every day, it is no wonder the financial conditions are becoming such that small craft are in danger, and have to go under.

Wool is beginning to come into The Dalles, but buyers are scarce and prices low. The outlook for wool growers is not bright, and the situation will not be improved until the silver question is settled.

Portland is preparing for her election, and it will be a race between the democrats and republicans, the citizens movement having lost its grip, and gone to pieces. Both parties have elected delegates to their conventions.

Nearly all who attend the Portland exposition, will be pained to learn that Liberti, is to furnish the music at the next meeting.

The Dalles reports the first Oregon strawberries in market this year, some being offered for sale there Wednesday.

Programme For Memorial Services.

Memorial services will be preached Sunday the 28th of May, at 11 a. m., in the U. B. church, by Rev. H. F. Gilt. The members of the G. A. R., W. R. C., and S. of V., and all old soldiers will meet at the G. A. R. hall at 10:30 and march to the church. Rev. C. W. Wells will have charge of the services at the church.

Memorial day May 30th, all members of the three orders and all citizens desiring to participate, will meet at Perry's corner at 8:30 a. m., and march from there to the cemetery and decorate the graves. At 10:30 a procession will form in front of Hanna's store with band leading, followed by the militia as escort, then the G. A. R., W. R. C., S. of V., Sunday schools, secret orders and citizens in general under the charge of marshals of the day, E. S. Olinzer and C. M. Wolfard, and march to Watson's grove, where there will be an address and other appropriate exercises. At the entrance to the grove there will be erected a monument to the fallen heroes, where all may place dedicated bouquets. There will be a basket dinner on the grounds, come prepared.
